## **'I'M REALLY HONOURED' — WOOLORAMA'S KELLY GORTER NAMED STATE RURAL AMBASSADOR AT PERTH ROYAL SHOW**

WA looks poised to make quite the impression at the Sydney Royal Easter Show, with the potential for a back-to-back win for the State in the National Rural Ambassador competition.

The face of Wagin Woolorama and livestock industry young gun Kelly Gorter was at the weekend bestowed the title of the Perth Royal Show 2021 Rural Ambassador. Ms Gorter — who grew up on a farm in Kojonup and now runs an electronic sheep ID tag consulting business out of Albany — said it was an “honour”. “There's a lot of really great competitors out there so it was an honour to be chosen,” she said.

It comes after two years proudly bearing the Wagin Woolorama Rural Ambassador sash — after the COVID-19 pandemic quashed agricultural shows Australia-wide last year and the 2020 competition circuit. A familiar face on the agricultural show circuit already, she will now represent the Royal Agricultural Society of WA at selected events with an agricultural and education focus as the “face” for primary production and agricultural shows in WA.

Come Easter — COVID-19 restrictions pending — she will head to Sydney to vie for the national title, which was last won in 2019 by Boyup Brook farmer Harris Thompson, who was the first national winner from WA in 16 years. It means after a decade-and-a-half without a national sash, WA could be looking at a back-to-back win. “That would be pretty awesome,” Ms Gorter said.

There will be plenty of familiar faces on the trip. “We ran the State finals of the Young Farmers Challenge on Saturday and the Woolorama team won that as well so we'll all be going over together,” Ms Gorter said. “It'll be fun. Mackenzie Walmsley, who won in 2019, will get to go to the finals as well so there'll be a few of us going over.”

Each year, up to 12 Rural Ambassadors are selected for each State, who then vie for the State title, before competing on the national stage to win the prestigious honour as the National Rural Ambassador. It is awarded to a young rural adult — aged between 20 and 30 — with a passion for living and working in rural communities.

## GREAT SOUTHERN JET RALLY

Another awesome Jet Rally was held in Wagin last Saturday the 9<sup>th</sup> and Sunday the 10<sup>th</sup> of October. Twenty-one aircraft were on display and the pilots enjoyed fine weather with light winds and cool temperatures after the event being postponed from the previous weekend due to bad weather.

Many visitors called in to check out the action and it was great to see many kids on the last weekend of their school holidays getting involved and taking an interest.







### **EXTRAORDINARY ELECTION – 17<sup>TH</sup> DECEMBER 2021**

At the close of nominations for the 2021 Local Government Elections, three (3) nominations for the four (4) vacancies were received. The candidates who nominated were declared elected. As there is one (1) vacancy remaining there is a requirement to conduct an extraordinary election.

Council will conduct an extraordinary election on Friday 17<sup>th</sup> December for one (1) vacancy for a four (4) year period to October 2025.

Advertising for candidates to lodge completed nominations will commence shortly.

### **CLEANING AND SEALING OF PAVED AREA AND FOOTPATHS IN WAGIN CBD**

The Shire has engaged a specialist contractor to carry out cleaning and sealing of the paved area and footpaths in the main CBD area of Wagin.

The works will be undertaken from Monday 11 October for approximately a week. This will entail high pressure cleaning of the paving and also the application of a two-coat seal.

The paved area will include Tudhoe, Tudor and Tavistock streets. The works should cause minimal disruption to the operation of businesses or to the community in general.

This project has been approved by Council in the 2021/2022 Budget and is part of the Shire's ongoing townscape works and town beautification program. The works have been funded by the Federal Government's Local Roads and Capital Infrastructure Program.

**BUSHFIRE VOLUNTEERS - NEW INDUSTRIAL MANSLAUGHTER LAWS**

The state government's new Work Health and Safety Act 2020 commences in January 2022 and will impact on the Shire's bushfire volunteers through the new Industrial Manslaughter laws.

The legislation deems all registered bushfire volunteers as employees of the Shire of Wagin and therefore the Shire has a duty of care to our volunteers regarding safety, performance, training and compliance.

The Shire of Wagin is working through the new legislation and is in the process of putting together a policy and procedures surrounding the management of the Shire's bushfire volunteers, this will include training provisions and recognition of existing fire-fighting experience (Recognition of Prior Learning).

The Shire of Wagin is committed to supporting all bushfire volunteers in addressing these new legislation changes to ensure all volunteers are legally covered and insured when they are attending a fire.

Once the new policy and procedures are adopted by Council, we will provide the details to all volunteers and the community in general.

**PRINCIPAL ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH OFFICER/BUILDING SURVEYOR**

Council is seeking a suitably qualified person to provide Environmental Health and Building Surveyor services to the Shires of Wagin, Williams and Dumbleyung. Applicants will (preferably) have a sound knowledge of local government operations and be familiar with the statutory and reporting requirements associated with the position. There is also the opportunity to become involved in assisting with project managing some small renovation/building projects which will add scope and interest to the range of duties. A salary package of between \$130,000 and \$140,000 is envisaged with a negotiable cash component of between \$90,000 and \$96,000. Comfortable housing will be made available, and a vehicle will be provided for business and private use. A performance-based contract of between 3 and 5 years will apply.

**RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD**

The Restricted burning period will commence on the 1<sup>st</sup> of October 2021 with a permit required to burn from the 1<sup>st</sup> October until the 31<sup>st</sup> October 2021.

During this period permits to burn can be obtained from your Local Volunteer Bush Fire Control Officer if you are outside the town boundary, or at the Shire of Wagin Office if your property is located within the Wagin town boundary.

The Prohibited burning period commences on the 1<sup>st</sup> of November 2021, please ensure that your firebreaks are in place by this date and maintained through to April 30, 2022.

**FIREBREAK NOTICE COMPLIANCE**

Residents and property owners are reminded of their obligations under the fire management requirements 2021 – 2022.

**Suburban & Residential blocks:**

1. Where the area of land is 0.202 hectares ½ an acre or less, all inflammable material on the land, shall be reduced to a height of less than 7.5 cm
2. Where the area of land exceeds 0.202 hectares ½ an acre in area, firebreaks at least 3 metres wide formed by either ploughing, cultivating, scarifying, burning or otherwise clearing shall be provided immediately inside all external boundaries of the land and inflammable material on the remainder of the land shall be reduced to a height of less than 7.5 cm
3. Buildings or haystacks within the firebreak described in (2) shall have the ground surface cleared to a distance of 6 metres from and encircling the building/s or haystack/s of all flammable material

**Rural Land in & outside of town boundary:**

Firebreaks at least 6 metres wide formed by either ploughing, cultivating, scarifying, burning or otherwise clearing shall completely encircle all buildings and haystacks.

Fuel tanks, whether containing fuel or not, shall have the ground surface cleared to a distance of 6 metres from encircling the tank/s of all inflammable material.

**All firebreaks as per above must be prepared on or before 1 November or within 14 days of becoming the owner or occupier should this be after that date and maintained clear of flammable material up to including 30 April.**

Staff will be carrying out compliance inspections on all properties within the town site, owners of those properties that do not comply with the Firebreak notice will be notified accordingly.

Penalties may apply for non-compliance.

# FOODWORKS

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*Get your copy before they run out.....!*



Hi to all our Wagin Library & Gallery patrons and friends.

There are insects, frogs, ants, bees, snakes, caterpillars to butterflies and moths during springtime. Are these animals and insects necessary to have in the garden or are they a pest? Which ones are the friends of the garden and which ones are the foes of our gardens? Sometimes you might even see some spiders. Please get an adult to help you look for these animals or insects as some of them may be poisonous.

**“Pests Diseases and Beneficials: Friends and Foes of Australian Gardens”** by **David Hockings**. This book is an adult non-fiction. *Pests, Diseases and Beneficials* helps the average gardener to identify and deal with those common insects and small animals that are found in every garden. There are clear descriptions and full colour images to aid in identifying insects and other organisms, providing useful advice on how to recognise and treat problems. There is also further information on plant diseases, bacteria and viruses.

**“Incredible Ants”** by **Susan Ashley**. What insects have jaws that open like scissors? What insects can carry things 20 times heavier than they are? What do ants look like? They’re ants. You can explore the ant colony to see workers, drones and the queen doing their jobs. It is a book that children of primary school age can read with their parents and have a discussion afterwards.

**“Caterpillars to Butterflies”** by **Bobbie Kalman**. Butterflies are the most beautiful insects. Butterflies come in a variety of colours. How can you tell the difference between a butterfly and a moth? Butterflies start off as caterpillars. How many stages do caterpillars have to go through to become a beautiful butterfly? This book is recommended for 6 to 8 year olds.

**“Life Cycle of a Frog”** by **Angela Royston**. This is a great book for parents and children to read together. There are many types of frogs in Western Australia. Frogs are amphibians. This means they spend part of their life in water and spend part of their life on land. How do frogs catch food? Do tadpoles have legs? Why do frogs live in the water?

**“Honeybee Hobbyist: The Care and Keeping of Bees”** by **Norman Gary, PhD**. This is an adult non-fiction book. Bee Keeping isn’t just for the professional farmer. Bees can be kept in any situation from simple backyards and rooftops to large expanses of farmland. Discover whether honey beekeeping is right for you and find out everything you need to know to keep and acquire bees. How can you start your own beehive? Care for your bees in each stage of life. How to keep your neighbours happy. Educate others about bees.

**“Australia’s Most Dangerous Spiders, Snakes and Marine Creatures”** by **Julian White**. This is an accessible field guide to our remarkable but sometimes lethal snakes, spiders and also marine creatures. The book has useful facts on the circumstances in which you are likely to encounter them. This would be a great book for parents and children to have a discussion after reading the book together.

**“Do Plants Really Eat Insects?”** by **Thomas Canavan**. How do plants know which way is up? Do plants really eat insects? Are tomatoes fruits or vegetables? Can you eat flowers? What is the smelliest fruit? Do plants grow on other planets?



# CARE AND SHARE MYSTERY BOOK

## THE SMALL FISH IN THE BIG POND (PART 2)

Hello everyone.

I believe we should start where we finished last story. As I mentioned in the last edition's story, my old primary school teacher gave me probably the most lasting impression that I will ever have: that life is like a small fish in a big pond. To me this is the story of life's events. I started mentioning how difficult the transition was from being at home with my mother and my small nucleus of a world to progressing to school.

As I have written about the small fish, over the next three years and culminating at the end of 1966 I was the big fish in the small pond. I knew the ropes. Nothing frightened me, I was the king of the playground. No more insecurities. I loved being at school, but that all changed at the start of the new year 1967. Now primary school awaited, small fish syndrome was once again a key factor in my life. The transition was not so traumatic as actually starting my educational path, but nothing prepared me for the realization that now I was expected to do homework. This was never in the job description, or so I thought.

I guess in retrospect my life was pretty uncomplicated. I believe schooling is the start of your social networking capabilities and how you integrate. I also believe it is the precursor to the rest of your life. In my opinion also, is the fact we are in a much different economic and socially demanding world that it once was. I relate this to my school homework wake up call. I believed in my own mind that going to school was enough time that I felt I should dedicate my own education. After school was for hanging out in my neighborhood. I mostly enjoyed my own company.

As I believe I have mentioned in my past stories, I did not possess many shop-bought toys for my amusement. I was much more akin to building my own projects with, as also mentioned, the bag of nails, the old pram I was allowed to pull apart and what I could scrounge from the small rubbish tip in our area, where I would usually find building materials. Playing at our local creek was another after school activity.

I guess it was not a matter of rebellious behavior, but I could not see the sense in devoting anymore of my time to schooling hours than I absolutely had to. The Education Department had another point of view, as I regularly bowled up to class with the previous night's assigned work not even looked at. My parents were informed of my lack of cooperation with the program that was set before me. Things were beyond my control. 'Get with the program Jeffery Stewart'. There was no choice.

I guess learning is a progressive science, in my opinion you only get back out of it what you are prepared to put into it. My whole outlook changed when my class was integrated into our in-school library. We would go on sojourns within our suburb usually once a week to our local shire library. This was awesome. I had never seen so many books in one place. Never in my wildest dreams did I perceive such a place existed. The greatest gift of all was that I received my very own library card. As I believe most of you would all be aware, you could borrow the books, take them home, read them and then return them within a set time. The world was my oyster, the small fish was once again starting to grow in the big pond that I call my life.

In closing, I hope you all enjoy this story. We may as well stay with this thread, as you can see a lot of the message focuses on schooling and education. I never forget how privileged I have been to receive such a wonderful education. I never take it for granted, and as Australians in my opinion, to stay on the coal face and keep progressing forward, we owe it not only to ourselves but to the most magnificent country we call Australia. # THE MYTH THAT MEN DON'T TALK

One of the things that never ceases to amaze me in the job we do, is that given the right circumstances (a safe place) blokes will disclose their issues and tell their story. Every bloke that I have met has a story and/or issues and is willing to talk.

Blokes do talk but we need to acknowledge the differences between how the genders go about this. There are also some other factors that need to be considered in how we go about talking with blokes. The differences are real and we need to recognise some of the communication disparities between blokes and ladies:

- Blokes only talk one third as much as ladies in a day (approx. 7,000 to 21,000 words). The majority of females think and speak in a narrative way whereas blokes prefer dot points.
- Single word responses to questions like - yes, no, good, bad and grunting are considered responses by blokes.
- Much of the additional talk that ladies do is around describing emotions and feelings. Therefore, in comparison to blokes, they have a sort of 'match fitness' around the ability to discuss emotion that we as blokes lack.
- In much the same way that the Inuit people have around 180 words to describe snow (because of its cultural and safety implications), the ladies in our life tend to operate with a larger word bank to deal with discussions around emotion and feelings.
- Blokes find it uncomfortable to talk about their emotions. We have been conditioned not to and are hard wired differently, often focusing on problem solving, providing and protecting, rather than how we feel, let alone talking about it.

To have a more productive outcome when having 'that talk', some other factors to consider include:

- Choosing the right environment to communicate is essential. This is not when we are distressed and out of control, but when we have calmed down. Also, avoid being under the influence of alcohol (this can act as a 'mood enhancer' and alter our state of mind).
- Timing is an important factor to consider. Agree on a designated time to talk, avoid times when you are preoccupied with other tasks, when there is a chance of being interrupted or when there are a lot of things happening.
- Be prepared to listen. The most important part of talking is *listening* (I think this is an oxymoron!) Having respect, connection and empathy with whom we are talking to will give us more of an opportunity to become an active listener.
- Getting help with having 'that talk' with your bloke. Don't be afraid to seek help in having a talk with your dad, husband, son or mate i.e., use an independent person, your GP or a counsellor.

Considering the above factors and 'giving permission' to blokes that it's okay to talk about things that cause us discomfort or pain may assist with blokes opening up more. Sometimes this does take time.

From little things big things grow (just like this year's crop), blokes do talk, so sow the seed towards a meaningful conversation. It is a myth 'that men don't talk'. They will, just not always in the way we expect.

## VANILLA SLICE WITH HONEYCOMB CRUNCH

### INGREDIENTS

- 2 sheets good-quality frozen butter puff pastry, just thawed
- 375ml (1 1/2 cups) pouring cream
- 170g (3/4 cup) caster sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 40g unsalted butter
- 375ml (1 1/2 cups) milk
- 35g (1/4 cup) cornflour
- 6 egg yolks
- Pistachio honeycomb, to decorate
- Toffee macadamias, to decorate
- Honey, to drizzle
- Caramel sauce
- 140g (2/3 cup) caster sugar
- 80ml (1/3 cup) pouring cream

### METHOD

#### Step 1

Preheat oven to 220C/200C fan forced. Line a baking tray with baking paper. Place 1 pastry sheet on prepared tray. Top the pastry with another sheet of baking paper and another baking tray on top. Bake for 15 minutes or until golden and cooked through. Set aside to cool completely. Repeat with remaining pastry sheet.

#### Step 2

Line the base and sides of a 22cm square cake pan with baking paper, allowing the paper to overhang 2cm above the sides. Place 1 pastry sheet in base of prepared pan, trimming to fit.

#### Step 3

Place the cream, sugar, vanilla, butter and 250ml (1 cup) milk in a large saucepan. Heat over medium heat until the mixture almost comes to the boil. Remove from heat.

#### Step 4

Combine cornflour, egg yolks and remaining milk in a jug. Gradually whisk the egg mixture into the cream mixture until well combined. Return the mixture to medium-low heat and cook, stirring constantly, for 5-10 minutes or until the custard thickens and comes to the boil. Spoon the hot custard over the pastry and smooth the surface. Top with the remaining pastry sheet, trimming to fit. Cover and place in the fridge for 4 hours or overnight to set.

#### Step 5

To make the caramel sauce, stir the sugar and 80ml (1/3 cup) water in a saucepan over low heat until the sugar dissolves. Simmer for 8 minutes or until golden. Reduce the heat to low and carefully whisk in the cream until combined. (Be careful it doesn't split.)

#### Step 6

To make the pistachio honeycomb. Place 335g (1 1/2 cups) white sugar, 60ml (1/4 cup) glucose syrup, 2 tbs golden syrup and 125ml (1/2 cup) water in a large saucepan over low heat. Cook, stirring, for 5-8 minutes or until sugar dissolves. Increase heat to high. Bring to boil. Cook, without stirring, for 5-7 minutes or until hard crack stage (153C) on a cook's thermometer and just colouring around edge. Remove from heat. Let bubbles subside. Stir in 2 tsp sifted bicarb with wooden spoon. Pour the mixture into a baking paper-lined roasting pan with paper overhanging the sides. Quickly scatter over 55g (1/3 cup) coarsely chopped pistachio kernels then set aside to cool completely.

#### Step 7

To make the toffee macadamias. Line a large baking tray with baking paper then place a wire rack over the tray. Individually pierce 145g (1 cup) whole macadamias with toothpicks. Place 215g (1 cup) caster sugar and 60ml (1/4 cup) water in a saucepan over low heat. Stir to dissolve. Brush downside with wet pastry brush to stop crystals forming. Increase heat to medium. Cook, without stirring, until golden. Holding toothpick, dip macadamia into toffee. Turn to coat, allowing excess to drip off. Once the drip of toffee creates a thin string, insert toothpick through rack so it hangs over edge, allowing excess to drip down onto paper.

#### Step 8

Coarsely chop the pistachio honeycomb. Cut the vanilla slice into 12 pieces. Top with the chopped honeycomb and toffee macadamias. Drizzle over the caramel sauce and honey to serve.
