SUN SHINES ON WAGIN OPEN GARDENS

The weather was just glorious on Saturday the 30th of October for the Wagin Open Gardens, a fundraiser event for the Wagin Bowling Club.

Six local gardens were open from 9.30am until 5.00pm and during the course of the day one hundred and sixty people took advantage of the opportunity to wander, as they pleased, amongst these gardens staying for as little time or as long as they desired.

Along with many Wagin residents, visitors travelled from far and wide including Corrigin, Yealering, Wickepin, Narrogin, Williams, Bunbury, Darkan, Arthur River, Dumbleyung, Tambellup, Broomehill, Katanning and Woodanilling as well as Perth and Mandurah.

Gardens were numbered and maps provided to make it easier for viewers to plan a circuit. Each garden was different in layout and design and at each there was an extra point of interest. The entry to each garden was marked by a large, attractive sign hand-painted by Perth artist Jean Prendergast who grew up in Wagin.

Garden 1: Mario and Robyn Carbone at 123 Bolt Road offered their Australian and exotic bird aviaries for viewing which people enjoyed. Other features were their beautiful, scented roses along with an intriguing rustic display around an old farm truck which is a relatively new addition to their garden.

Garden 2: Noleen and Eric Tuffin's back garden at 16 Gordon Street was the place where people could take a break for a sausage sizzle lunch, cooked by a bowling club volunteer. Visitors could be excused for thinking they had stepped into Bali when roaming in the shade of palms and ferns while enjoying this garden. A wooden bridge was a feature in the colourful front garden.

Garden 3: Kerry and Trevor Walker at 39 Unicorn Street welcomed visitors to roam around their lovely, designed garden which featured trees, arbours, native plants including kangaroo paws, and spectacular roses including several huge Mutablis variety bushes with their eye-catching multicoloured blooms. At this venue there was a display of metal garden art sculptures with items for sale.

Garden 4: Kerry and Ron Walker's garden at 7 Ware Street was where the kettle was hot and Devonshire teas were on offer. Bowling club helpers produced scones to enjoy with jam and cream along with tea or coffee. There was a party atmosphere as people not only enjoyed the tea break but the opportunity to discover all the hidden, quirky corners of this garden. A scarecrow kept a watchful eye over the vegetable garden, there was a cubby to explore, and weathered wood features and patchwork quilts on display in amongst the plants.

Garden 5: Bill and Val Atkinson at 15 Ware Street are in the process of putting their own stamp on this beautiful garden having bought the home during this year. The extras offered for sale at this venue were home-made preserves and crafts. Visitors were treated to background music as hits from the 70s and 80s could be heard across the lawn. The property looked colourful with roses and pots of flowering petunias lining the front steps.

Viewers were able to gain ideas for combining garden art and design with carefully manicured and shaped plants to create an overall pleasing effect. The Open Gardens proved a very successful fundraiser for the Wagin Bowling Club and the club is very thankful to the owners of the gardens which were on display. A lot of work over many months produced these gardens in spectacular condition and this work was appreciated. Also appreciated were the community volunteers who worked behind the scenes and on the day including at the entry gates where it was required to keep a register of all those who entered.



SHIRE OF WAGIN NEWS



DALE LLOYD ELECTED AS COUNCILLOR

It was announced on Wednesday the 10th of November that Dale Lloyd has been elected to the office of Councillor for the District Ward of the Shire of Wagin. Dale was elected unopposed for a four-year term expiring in 2025. Dale has worked with Narrogin Technology Solutions for nearly fourteen years. He remains an active member of the Wagin Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service, having received a long service medal for ten years of diligent service in 2016.

MELBOURNE CUP COMES TWICE

Wagin Homecare clients were lucky enough to celebrate Melbourne Cup twice this week. First was Monday in Darkan at Bingo with a beautiful afternoon tea courtesy of Vanessa. Then a Cup Day luncheon at the Eric Farrow Pavilion on Tuesday, with games, sweeps and "fashions of the lunch". Well done Alicia on your win!

WAGIN CHRISTMAS STREET CARNIVAL

The annual Christmas Street Carnival is set for Friday the 17th of December in Tavistock Street. Festivities start at 5.30pm and continue to 8.30pm. There will be lots to see and do including a wide variety of rides, new and interesting stalls, fabulous food, live music, Santa, kids' entertainment, face painting and much more.

We have been very fortunate to receive an \$8,000 Lotterywest Grant and a \$2,500 Roadwise Grant towards the event, plus on-going support from the Shire, Wagin Action Group and the Wagin Chamber of Commerce.



VANDALISM AND DAMAGE IN WAGIN

The recent spate of vandalism and damage in Wagin in recent weeks has escalated. This has comprised of ongoing destruction and/or theft of street signs (Unicorn and Johnston Streets in particular), damaged street trees and damage to the fence outside of the Library.

During last weekend, toilets at both the Town Square and the Wetlands Park were damaged and rendered unusable. A fire was also lit in one of the cubicles. Fence railing adjacent to the oval was also damaged.

These matters have been reported to the Police who are viewing CCTV footage and pursuing leads that will hopefully lead to the apprehension of offenders.

This damage is costing ratepayers dearly and detracts from what is otherwise a very attractive town which is much valued by locals and visitors alike.

Members of the community who witness the occurrence of vandalism and damage are encouraged to notify Wagin Police on 9852 0000 or the Shire on 9861 1177. Any leads would be appreciated to help stop this problem before it escalates further.

WAGIN RECREATION CENTRE COURT SURFACE

Specialist Contractors are currently carrying out some much-needed repairs to the Recreation Centre court surface. The repairs will be completed by Wednesday the 17th of November. The courts will then be able to be used by the community.

ROADWORKS

The Shire Works Crew have been constructing a section of Unicorn Street, ready for seal.

The Works crew are currently in the process of backfilling the new kerbs on Sawle, Morris & Stubbs Streets.

The Grader operators have been carrying out maintenance grading on the following roads:

- Jaloran Road
- McDougalls Road
- Murdoch Road
- Robinson Road
- Wagin-Wickepin Road

RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD

The Restricted burning period has been extended until the 14th of November with a permit required to burn until this new date.

During this period permits to burn can be obtained from your Local Volunteer Bush Fire Control Officer if you are outside the town boundary, or at the Shire of Wagin Office if your property is located within the Wagin town boundary.

The Prohibited burning period now commences on the 15th of November. Please ensure that your firebreaks are in place now and maintained through to the 30th of April 2022.

FIREBREAK NOTICE COMPLIANCE

Residents and property owners are reminded of their obligations under the fire management requirements 2021-2022.

Suburban & Residential blocks:

1. Where the area of land is 0.202 hectares ½ an acre or less, all inflammable material on the land shall be reduced to a height of less than 7.5 cm .
2. Where the area of land exceeds 0.202 hectares ½ an acre in area, firebreaks at least 3 metres wide formed by either ploughing, cultivating, scarifying, burning or otherwise clearing shall be provided immediately inside all external boundaries of the land, and inflammable material on the remainder of the land shall be reduced to a height of less than 7.5 cm.
3. Buildings or haystacks within the firebreak described in (2) shall have the ground surface cleared to a distance of 6 metres from and encircling the building/s or haystack/s of all flammable material.

Rural Land in & outside of town boundary:

Firebreaks at least 6 metres wide formed by either ploughing, cultivating, scarifying, burning or otherwise clearing shall completely encircle all buildings and haystacks.

Fuel tanks, whether containing fuel or not, shall have the ground surface cleared to a distance of 6 metres from encircling the tank/s of all inflammable material.

All firebreaks as per above must be prepared on or before the 1st November, or within 14 days of becoming the owner or occupier should this be after that date, and maintained clear of flammable material up to and including the 30th of April 2022.

Staff will be carrying out compliance inspections on all properties within the town site. Owners of those properties that do not comply with the Firebreak notice will be notified accordingly. Penalties may apply for non-compliance.

Fauna Survey Approval

It is quite the process to get approval to undertake fauna surveys where you will be directly impacting on native animals.

We are happy to report that at the start of November we received our approval to go ahead with fauna surveys for the next three years.

On this note, Gen will be contacting those who expressed interest earlier this year. Apologies that we were unable to get any trapping done this year, but it did take several months to get approval. We will look to do surveying next year in autumn and spring. On that note, we will be looking to survey more properties, with a total of fifteen expected by the end of 2023.

If you have some bush on your place that has a decent understory, and would like to find out what lives within it, get in touch with Gen and see if you can get in on the program!



Fencing & Revegetation Funding Accompanying Surveys

Within this fauna project we do also have fencing and revegetation available. Ideally it is to support sites that have been found to be fauna habitat, but not excluding those that are not being surveyed.

If you have sites you have been thinking of protecting or improving, get in touch.

Hoggone Bait Box Hire

We have discussed the Hoggone bait box system and held a workshop around how to effectively use the product. We now have on board two bait boxes which we encourage the community to make use of this summer period as pigs start to become visible again.

If you were unable to attend the demonstration day, we can run you through the process on how to get results. We have a local contractor in the area who has been having success with this product and we can also put you onto Daniel if you wish to get more insight into the best methods to successfully lure pigs to traps and baits etc.

Baits for the boxes can be purchased locally through Elders. If you would like to hire the boxes, please get in touch with Gen. When the boxes go out, they are likely to be out for a few weeks at a time, so it will pay to get in touch if you think you will be looking to use them this summer.



Contractor Funding Unsuccessful

Unfortunately, we didn't have any luck with our grant application which sought to gain funding to employ a pig control contractor across the Arthur River region.

The funders recognised that this would be a good program to undertake, but were keen to see more community input into pig controls before they were willing to fund this activity. On that note, we would be keen to hear from you if you are already out there managing pigs so that we can quantify a bit more accurately how much work is already going on by land owners in the district. If you have shooters come out regularly, do any work yourself or are seeing changes in numbers, please contact Gen at the office as this may help us to build a better application for next year's funding round.



Snake Removal Service

Gen has completed training and we now have the appropriate kit for snake removal.


If you have a snake found at home that needs to be removed back out into the bush, you can now contact us at WWLZ and Gen can come out and safely remove the snake for release into bushland out of town.

If you want to utilise this service, it will be available on weekdays primarily, as Gen does live in Narrogin. It may be harder to get this service on weekends. We would try to assist where we can on weekends as well when Gen can get down to Wagin.

Rushy Swamp Woodanilling

Bird Hide Project Approved

We are happy to report we have been successful with a funding application to extend environmental activities in the lakes in our region, with our Rushy Swamp bird hide project going ahead.

Rushy Swamp is located on private land, located on the way between Lake Queerearup and



Woodanilling. It is a hotspot for water bird life when it is full as it currently is now. This project will see a bird hide erected on the edge of the lake and interpretive signage and a parking bay to suit larger recreational vehicles will be constructed.

This will showcase how even these small shallow lakes fill an important role in the cycle of our wildlife.

This project is funded from the Western Australian Government's State Natural Resource Management Program.

Wagin Lake Boardwalk

If anyone has been out to Wagin Lake recently, it may appear that the idea behind the bird hide was not well thought out, as in fact you would currently need waders or a boat to get out to it. However, there was method in the madness!



Due to the small grant budgets for these projects, the Wagin Lake program was spaced out into several stages over separate grants. A boardwalk was due to be constructed to the hide about the week after the first of the big rains came this year. As we know, it has barely stopped since then. The lake is beautifully full now, with a great range of birds on it. However, there is no boardwalk as of yet!

We have had to postpone the program for this activity, being granted a twelve-month extension. We are hoping the water level recedes enough to undertake the required construction work by December 2022.

WA SAFE TRANSITION PLAN

WA Government – Friday 5th November

WA has announced a Safe Transition Plan in line with expert health advice. The transition will occur when WA reaches a double dose vaccination rate of 90% of the eligible population (12 years and over) and is expected in late January or early February.

With both parents now deceased, Tom in 1972 and Milly in 1973, the six siblings decided that they would come together once a year to catch up. The Douglas children consisted of Chesney, Robert, Conrad, Clyde, Phyllis and Maxwell. They were a tight bunch with a novel of stories in each of them about growing up, hanging out and starting their own families. These family reunions were legendary in the family history with many a wild night retold and embellished to the next generation.

It would start with booking into a motel in South Perth, very often the Swan View Motel, on a Friday afternoon where the first whiskey was downed in true Douglas brotherly fashion. Then it was off to Gloucester Park for a night of racing. Saturday would see the punters off to the races, the girls off to shop or the movies and then the big night was Saturday where they would have a dinner and a show. Sunday morning was a late breakfast, goodbyes and returning to home, wherever that may be.

Every family has its stories that over the space of time become legendary tales and these gatherings of the 'Clan' members give rise to many memories. The Reunion of 1995 held at the Blarney Castle in Perth was an exceptional year for the Douglasses. The second generation had decided to surprise the originals and booked a table right next to theirs. When they were all seated and the show was about to begin, in we all waltzed with much frivolity to a stunned table of parents who couldn't quite believe their eyes. The cousins had joined the party. It was a wild night and a great time was had by all. It was to be the last reunion that the six children of Tom and Milly would share together with Conrad going to that great big shed in the sky in the November of 1995.

Since then, Chesney and Robert have also passed away, along with others both young and old and we celebrate them all every reunion. Young Maxwell Douglas along with his wife Judy have attended every gathering and this year is no exception. They are the hosts of this year's reunion which is now a single day affair that often drifts into Sunday breakfast. With four generations now taking part it is miraculous that we can coordinate a weekend together.

The year 2022 will see the Golden Anniversary of fifty Years of Douglas family reunions, which will be held back in Wagin where it all began. With our family crest of 'Jamais Arriere' meaning Never Behind and our slogan 'A Douglas! A Douglas!', it will be a spring to remember and more memories will be made for the next generation to share.

A warehouse fire has dealt a devastating blow to Great Southern Towing in Narrogin. The Wagin, Narrogin and Williams fire services were called to the blaze at 12.50am on the morning of Sunday the 7th of November. Despite their best efforts, the warehouse and its contents were destroyed. Welshpool firefighters assisted until Monday to completely eliminate the fire.

On Sunday the Department of Fire and Emergency services said it was too early to determine the cause of the fire. The owners Sarah and Stuart Brindley have since confirmed that video footage reveals it was a terrible accident.

Despite their loss, Sarah and Stuart have focused on their gratitude for all the aid they have received. They thanked nearly twenty business by name who provided assistance during and after the fire, as well as the local Shire, volunteer emergency services, investigative teams, helpful local residents, friends and family.

Sarah and Stuart have also shown resolve, having determined to rebuild from disaster, and do their best to work and trade as normal. Their Federal Street office is still running; however, the wreckers is closed.

Unfortunately, Graeme Turner of GT Radiators also lost a lot of gear in the fire and Great Southern Towing extended their deepest sympathies to him.

Great Southern Towing has had to request that people please avoid walking and driving around the property unless absolutely necessary, due to the need for trucks to pass through the area and the number of vehicles that require important and clear access to the site.



DISASTER ASSISTANCE FOR ROE HIT HARD BY JULY STORMS

Member for Roe, Peter Rundle MLA, has welcomed financial aid becoming available for local governments in the Electorate of Roe to help with repairs following heavy rain, strong winds and flooding in July.

Mr Rundle said the jointly funded assistance from the Commonwealth and State Government, through the Disaster Recovering Funding Arrangements, will ensure local ratepayers are not burdened with the cost of the clean-up.

"The severe storms between 20th and 31st of July caused extensive damage to infrastructure and public assets throughout the southwest region," Mr Rundle said.

"Some areas recorded more than 75mm of rain within 24 hours, causing flooding to major roads, while winds of up to 126km/h felled trees across roads.

The impact of the storms caused major disruptions for residents and businesses in Roe and this disaster funding will go a long way as we rebuild and get back on track."

Disaster recovery assistance is available to the local government areas of Augusta-Margaret River, Boddington, Busselton, Corrigin, Dumbleyung, Katanning, Narrogin, Pingelly, Wagin and West Arthur. The funding can be used to help cover the costs of restoring and repairing state and local government road networks, as well as supporting ongoing recovery operations.

THE SMALL FISH IN THE BIG POND (PART 4)

This is the last part in the series of stories I have been writing over our last editions. As you are well aware from the previous stories, the theme is regarding life's progression of learning to accept and dealing with being put into a particular situation through life. The kind that seems to be quite overwhelming at first, but as you become more familiar with your situation and learn to deal with it, you are no longer what I refer to as 'the small fish in the big pond'. In my opinion, when you become familiar with any of life's situations you become 'the large fish in a small pond'.

So let us begin. My previous stories involved my own learning curves through life. At the end of 1974 I embarked on my biggest small fish adventure that has now become my life thus far. I had finished my high school education and had finished my tenure with acceptable results. I managed to secure an apprenticeship as a fitter/machinist with a company in Newcastle, New South Wales that made steel pipes and fittings. I had previously mentioned that high school was a big wakeup call partly from the fact that in the vicinity of seven hundred students were there. This time there were probably in the vicinity of over two thousand employees who worked at this company.

The facility worked twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, with my thirty-four hours being spread over three shifts. Suddenly my life involved becoming more regulated than ever before. I rode my bicycle up to a main artery that led from our suburb into Newcastle. There was a special government bus that took me to work. You were issued an employee number and a card which you put into a machine with a clock on its face that recorded your attendance. You did the same to acknowledge that you had finished your days' work.

At the end of the week the company paid you. I was paid forty-two dollars. Not only was I learning a trade, I was being paid to learn that trade. To me it was all the money in the world. It gave me the most satisfying feeling to give my mother ten dollars a week for my keep. It made me realise that this was what life was all about. After all the years my parents had taken care of my wellbeing, I finally had the chance to give them something back towards the running of the house. The biggest realisation was the fact that if I saved my money, I could afford to buy all the things I had dreamed about. For instance, my first new surfboard. That progressed to buying a car and new clothes that I really liked. Even though I still lived at home the values that had been instilled into me by my parents, be independent and be your own person, were really coming into play.

This was a huge pond that I was in. I was once more a very small fish. Once a week for three years the company paid for you to go to technical College to learn your chosen trade. My first day at college was a benchmark for me. My theory teacher explained to the class that it was up to us whether we chose to succeed or fail in our chosen profession. Not that my teacher did not care about this fact. It was the fact that if we did not want progress, it was not his affair. That thought has always stayed with me. As human beings we are in my opinion all responsible for our own destiny. Whether we succeed in making a good footprint through life is down to your own self.

After four years the huge pond once again became much smaller. I finished my three years of college education and passed with acceptable results. That gave me the necessary qualifications that lead me after four years of my apprenticeship to become fully qualified as a fitter/machinist. As mentioned in a previous story, towards the end of my apprenticeship tenure I wanted to perhaps pursue riding a surfboard as a career. But over a few beers with my father, it was a much better decision to finish my apprenticeship. This trade has stayed with me my whole life. I have done many jobs over the years, but my trade has always been there for me to fall back on.

In closing, when I was at school my grand ambition was to one day no longer have to do homework. But guess what, if you want to succeed in life there is, in my opinion, always study to do. Being a Freemason, that is a given. You are always studying if you want to progress in the order. But you can relate this opinion to any work, or any activity you participate in. I am truly thankful to our country and the education system it provides to us for making my life what it has been so far. So to all the small fish, keep swimming and keep growing and look forward as I do to the next big pond adventure. I hope you all have enjoyed this series of stories.


THE IMPORTANCE OF HAVING AN INDEPENDENT DESIGN WHEN BUILDING



Almost 100 a people a month are being diagnosed with lung cancer in WA

Cancer Council WA is encouraging adults in the Wheatbelt region to familiarise themselves with the common symptoms of lung cancer, with data revealing almost 100 people a month are diagnosed with lung cancer in WA.

Lung cancer was the fifth most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australia in 2017 and the most common cause of cancer death in 2019 according to Australian Institute of Health and Welfare data. "Our latest data in 2018 reveals that in the Wheatbelt, 54 people were diagnosed with lung cancer and 28 people have lost their lives from this disease," Ms Andrews said.

"If you've coughed up blood or had a long-standing cough that worsens or changes, repeated chest infections, shortness of breath, unexplained weight loss, difficulty swallowing, loss of appetite or persistent chest or shoulder pain, then it's important to get it investigated.

It doesn't mean you've got cancer, often it turns out to be something less serious, though it's critical to have the symptoms investigated early to be sure. Remember, the chances of successful treatment are much higher when cancer is found early.

We know people living in regional Australia have lower rates of five year survival for all cancers combined [*editor: follow the QR code*], compared with people living in major cities, so we urge anyone in the Wheatbelt experiencing a symptom to visit their doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker," Ms Andrews said.



Eighty per cent of lung cancers in Australia are caused by smoking. According to the WA Health and Wellbeing Surveillance System, 11.5% of adults in Western Australia were daily or occasional smokers in 2018. Other known causes of lung cancer include occupational carcinogens such as silica dust and diesel engine exhaust, and if a person has a family history of lung cancer or previous lung disease their risk of lung cancer is also increased.

Ms Andrews said people from regional WA were particularly likely to delay going to a medical clinic when they were experiencing symptoms, with many thinking the symptom could be due to something else.

Cancer Council WA's Wheatbelt Regional Education Officer Kaylor Andrews said it's important to visit your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker right away if you experience any symptoms.





AIR FRYER CRUMPET GARLIC BREAD

INGREDIENTS

- 150g salted butter, at room temperature
- 1/4 cup finely chopped fresh continental parsley
- 4 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 tsp sea salt flakes
- 300g pkt crumpets, halved
- 100g (1 cup) pre-grated 3 cheese blend



METHOD

Step 1

Combine butter, parsley, garlic and salt in a bowl. Spread generous teaspoonfuls over each crumpet half. Scatter a generous pinch of cheese over half of the crumpet halves.

Step 2

Arrange remaining crumpet halves over the cheese to make half-moon crumpet sandwiches. Transfer sandwiches, cut side down, to an air fryer basket lined with foil. Sprinkle over remaining cheese.

Step 3

Air fry for 8 minutes at 180C until golden and cheese is melted.

Step 4

To serve, brush over remaining garlic butter.

CHOC-PEANUT CONDENSED MILK DUMP CAKE

INGREDIENTS

- 12 choc ripple biscuits
- 395g can sweetened condensed milk
- 9 x 12g Cadbury Dairy Milk Freddos
- 200g smooth peanut butter
- 540g pkt chocolate fudge cake mix
- 150g unsalted butter, chilled, thinly sliced into 30 pieces
- 125ml (1/2 cup) milk
- Cream, to serve (optional)



METHOD

Step 1

Preheat oven to 180°C/160°C fan forced. Grease a 5cm-deep, 20 x 26cm rectangle cake pan. Line with baking paper, allowing paper to overhang sides.

Step 2

Arrange biscuits in a single layer over the base of the cake pan. Pour over condensed milk. Arrange the Freddos on top and fill gaps with spoonfuls of peanut butter. Sprinkle over cake mix, spreading with a fork to cover. Arrange butter in rows over the cake mix and pour over milk.

Step 3

Bake for 35-40 minutes. Leave in the tin until cooled completely. Use the baking paper to transfer the cake to a serving board. Serve with cream, if using.
