#### **BUMPER RESULT AT WAGIN-WOODY FOX SHOOT**

Gen Harvey, Wagin Woodanilling Landcare Zone

We held our fox shoot this year to fit in with the Red Card for Red Fox fundraising program which raises money for Regional Mens Health Initiative. The organisation designates dates that you can pick from to be included, and this year we went with the weekend of the 17<sup>th</sup> to the 19<sup>th</sup> of March.

We combined the Shires of Wagin and Woodanilling and held our tally and breakfast at Becker's property in Woodanilling.

We had a great turn out for the brekky which saw six teams from Wagin and four teams from Woodanilling participating. We had prizes for placing teams and a few individual prizes as well, thanks to our fantastic range of sponsors: Elders Wagin, Wagin Agri Services, Woodanilling Tavern, Wagin Action Group, PYNC Invasive Animal Control, Tally Tags, Woodanilling General Store, Galts Hardware Wagin, Foodworks Wagin and Steelo's Guns & Outdoors. Thank you to this group of sponsors for helping us deliver a great community event.



We ended up with a huge tally count, with 326 foxes, 7 cats, 73 rabbits and 6 pigs. With \$5 donated by the Sporting Shooters' Association of Australia for every fox and cat culled, we have raised \$1,665 to go towards Regional Men's Health. Well done to all involved for participating in a good cause.

The winner this year was Wagin's shooting team over at Jaloran Farm. They got a whopping 60 foxes, along with 13 rabbits, 1 cat and 3 pigs that took them over the line. In second place was the Dawson team from Wagin with 32 foxes, 38 rabbits and 1 cat. Third place was a draw for Wagin's Hunt, Catch, Cook team and Woodanilling's Franks.



#### **ADMINISTRATION OFFICE CLOSED – EASTER PUBLIC HOLIDAYS**

The Shire Administration Office will be closed on Good Friday the 7<sup>th</sup> of April and Easter Monday the 10<sup>th</sup> of April, reopening at 8.30am on Tuesday the 11<sup>th</sup> of April.

#### SHARPS CONTAINERS AND RUBBISH BINS

The Shire has identified that incorrect disposal of sharps containers into domestic rubbish and recycling bins is occurring. This is a significant safety risk to anyone using the bins or processing waste. Sharps containers *must* be disposed of safely and properly.

**Sharps Storage**: If you use needles or syringes on a regular basis, you can purchase containers for approximately \$8 (small) or \$16 (medium) from your local pharmacy. These containers are the recommended storage units for needles and syringes. Fitpacks have a container within the pack.

**Sharps Disposal**: With the lid sealed securely, please return your full container to the local needle and syringe exchange program site. This is the Wagin District Hospital. Other sites can be found at healthywa.wa.gov.au/Articles/U\_Z/Where-to-find-needle-and-syringe-programs-in-WA (or use the QR code). The Shire has



a disposal box for needles at the Tavistock Street toilets and the Wetlands toilets at the men's entry side. Thank you for keeping the community safe.

#### **COMMUNITY BUDGET REQUESTS 2023/2024 – OPEN NOW!**

The Shire of Wagin is inviting Community Groups and Organisations to submit their applications for Council contributions to community projects. Shire contributions of up to \$10,000 in value will be considered by Council as Community Budget Requests for 2023/2024. Applications must be in writing and demonstrate a positive contribution to the Wagin community. Applications over \$10,000 will only be considered on a 'one-third Council Contribution, two-thirds Applicant' Grant Contribution basis. Application forms are available at the Shire of Wagin's Administration Office or via the website at wagin.wa.gov.au. Applications close on Friday the 12th of May 2023.

#### COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Local Government bi-annual elections will take place in October 2023. At each election, a number of council positions are vacated with a call for candidates. In the lead-up to the election, the Shire of Wagin will present information sessions for persons interested in nominating or seeking to understand the election process. Please check the Shire News and Shire of Wagin website regularly.

#### RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD

All residents are reminded that the Shire of Wagin is now in a Restricted Burning Period (15<sup>th</sup> of March 2023 – 30<sup>th</sup> of April 2023). Under the Bush Fires Act 1954 and the Shire of Wagin Fire Management Requirements (as issued with property owner rates notices), **permits to burn are required** which may be obtained from volunteer Fire Control Officers (all rural areas) or the Shire office (all town residents). For further information including burn periods or Fire Control Officers, please refer to the Shire website under Services>Emergency Services.

The Shire of Wagin supports volunteers. Have you got a My Bush Fire Plan? Create one in under fifteen minutes by visiting mybushfireplan.wa.gov.au or downloading the My Bushfire Plan app from the App Store or Google Play.

#### **ROADWORKS**

The Shire Works crew are starting to gravel sheet a 2km section on Angwins Road, south of Dwelyerdine Road.

New kerbs are complete at the Cemetery. We are now backfilling with gravel and compacting.

We are working on clearing an access path to the water tank at Badgarning Reserve. This tank is for firefighting purposes.

Sportsground oval turf renovations are being carried out. Sporting clubs can still practice on the oval while work is in progress.

# SHIRE OF WAGIN COUNCILLOR PROFILE

Cr Ann O'Brien



#### What is your day job and how does it relate to your role as a Councillor?

I have been a Health Systems Support Officer with WA Country Health Service for over five years and an administrator with the Department of Health for approximately thirty years. I am passionate about Health and this has flowed over to my Councillor position. Confidentiality is a big part of my Health 'day job' and the same principles apply to my Councillor work. As a Councillor you need to be organised and even though the work is volunteered it requires as much patience, commitment and focus as my 'paid work'.

#### What spurred you to run for Council?

Even though I have only been living in the Shire of Wagin for five years I have always wanted to be an active member of the community. This has included volunteer work which has been fantastic! Inevitably, when chatting with others, talk comes around to the Council – some of it positive and some not so positive. After a while I realised how the direction and the decision making of the Shire Council impacted our community and I wanted to be part of that process. Initially I attended a 'Councillor Orientation' event to gain some information about being a Councillor and I believed I had the skill set and commitment to do this. I was elected the second time I applied. I have been a Councillor for almost two years.

#### What are the biggest challenges you have faced as a Councillor?

At first, I was quite overwhelmed and thought to myself, "What have I committed to, this is not me!" I really did not know fully what was required of me and felt unproductive. I was advised part of the Local Government requirements is that all new Councillors must complete several online courses within the first twelve months, covering Serving on Council, Conflict of Interest, Understanding Local Government, Finances and Meeting Processes – this in itself required several hours of online learning and considerable self-discipline. But I got through it and what I learnt from the courses and listening to my fellow Councillors has contributed to me becoming a more confident and active Council member.

#### What are some of the great positives you take from being a councillor?

Being an elected member can be rewarding and as I became more confident, I actually feel that I am contributing to the Council meetings in a positive way. Most importantly I have a clearer understanding of how the Wagin Shire and our community functions. At times people have stopped me in the street or even given me a call to discuss an issue or concern they may be experiencing. I listen to them and depending on the issue or concern I can explain to them, "This is what I can do". I always follow up with them to make sure they have received a response.

#### What advice would you give to someone considering running for council?

I would say, "Go for it!" To get a feel for Council attend a Council meeting as a member of the public – anyone can do this. All you need to do is listen and this would give you the best understanding of how the Council operates. Attend the Councillor Orientation evening and have a chat with one of our Shire Councillors or the Shire President – we would encourage you to nominate as a Shire Councillor. It is important to remember being a Shire Councillor requires a genuine commitment to the local community, a tremendous amount of patience and a desire to want to do the right thing by the community.



#### **PUBLIC NOTICE**

#### Fire Weather Officers

In accordance with s. 38 (8) of the Bush Fire Act 1954, the Council of the Shire of Wagin has appointed the Chief Bush Fire Control Officer Ross Goldsmith as Fire Weather Officer for the district of Wagin.

The Fire Weather Officer has discretion to approve permits to burn where the Bureau of Meteorology has issued fire weather warnings; this discretion is limited, applies to local conditions and does not over-ride prohibited burning times or total fire bans.

Should the Fire Weather Officer be unavailable, two deputies are appointed to act as fire weather officer. In order of seniority, they are Xavier White and Anthony Rowell.

More information is included in the Council Minutes for 28th March 2023 on the Shire website.

Permits to burn may be issued by a Fire Control Officer for rural areas or the Shire office for town locations. The contact details of all fire control officers can be viewed at the Shire of Wagin website: (Services / Emergency Services / Fire Control Officers)

Permits are required in the period 15<sup>th</sup> March to 30<sup>th</sup> April 2023. If you are in any doubt about your obligations, please contact the Shire office on 9861 1177 or speak with a Fire Control Officer.





#### Fauna Trapping Season

Now that it is autumn, we are back in trapping season, so we will be conducting surveys over April and May.

We are inviting community members to come along and help Gen set traps at the beginning, check the traps in the morning and record data. Learn the trapping process and possibly get the chance to see some critters!

Trapping at one site over a week, traps are checked early in the morning every day, and then traps are closed off until later in the evening when they are opened again ready to trap overnight.

We invite volunteers to come along for either a day or the whole week. It is usually around 7.30am for an hour or so, weather permitting. We close traps in poor weather for animal welfare concerns.

#### Your Landcare Centre Needs You!

We cannot fund saltbush the way we used to, but there are still ways to improve saline landscapes. Fencing and revegetation needs to have public benefits these days. What are your thoughts on this change? What do you see as 'public benefit'?

**Events** – What sort of activities would you like Landcare to coordinate? We have done nightstalks, weed management, snake handling, field days, bioblitz, school trips and more... What would you like to see, learn or do that we can help make happen?

**Ag Trials** – Are you trialling something different in your pasture systems? Would you like to see something specific investigated on a local level? Would you like to participate in development of new practices?

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

**Quentins** by **Maeve Binchy**. This is an adult fiction book. The title refers to Quentins restaurant, a fictional upscale dining establishment in central Dublin. Is it possible to tell the story of a generation and a city through the history of this restaurant? Ella Brady thinks so. She wants to film a documentary about Quentins that will capture the spirit of Dublin.

**The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe** by **C. S. Lewis**. This is a junior fiction book which has enchanted children and adults for years. Peter, Susan, Edmund and Lucy come across an old wardrobe and found a land beyond the wardrobe door, a secret place that is frozen in eternal winter. There are important lessons in Narnia, including that looks can be deceiving and two wrongs don not make a right.

**The Complete Works of William Shakespeare**. Shakespeare produced most of his known work between 1590 and 1613. His early plays were mainly comedies and histories, genres he raised to the peak of sophistication. Next, he wrote mainly tragedies until about 1608, including *Hamlet*, *King Lear*, and *Macbeth*. Those are considered some of the finest examples in the English language.

#### MORE MEMORIES OF WAGIN'S BYGONE DAYS



#### The Wagin Flour Mill

Built in 1906, the Wagin Flour Mill was a thriving place that worked twenty-four hours a day in the busy seasons.

The manager back then was Crawford Hall and the boss of the staff was Bob Lee.

To follow the path from grain to flour, it starts with a roadway built through the right side of the building where the grain can be delivered. There was no bulk handling of grain then; all grain was carried in 3 bushels (83kg) bags. Farmers drove their trucks into the tunnel and poured the grain into a chute built down under the ground level.



Now we go over to the railway further down the track towards Katanning and find a junction with points that can steer the wagons onto a track that sweeps around across Ventnor Street to go right into that roadway. Here the bags are poured down that chute. The bottom of the chute is the start of a chain elevator that has buckets on it to scoop up the grain and carry it right up above the top floor of the mill where it is dumped down to begin the next process. The product is then dropped down to the next floor until it ends up milled into 'Albatross' brand flour ready to be bagged. The carriages are then hauled back by the train to be loaded and sent on their way to market.

The mill had its own powerhouse built on the back where they had two big single cylinder gas engines mounted horizontally on the floor with a big flywheel on each end of the crankshaft. The engines were water cooled. There was a big dam built across the other side of Victor Street and water was pumped over to the engines and then the very hot water was pumped back to the dam.

At some time in the 1940s the mill bought a new engine that was more powerful and this required a new bigger mounting foundation.

The old concrete foundation was dug up and the hole made a bit bigger to make the stronger base. To add extra strength, it was decided to put some re-enforcing steel in the concrete mix. So as the concrete was poured, they put in layers of old steel fence posts, bedframes, gates and whatever they could find.

When the foundation was finished and they were clearing everything away someone accidentally bumped one of the pedestals that stick up to carry the outrigger crankshaft

bearings and knocked a lump off.

It was decided to send it away to be tested to make sure the concrete was up to standard. They were horrified to find it was not up to scratch and more horrifying, their insurance company heard about it and said they would not insure the engine or the room unless a new foundation was provided!

So, they started cutting up the concrete with jackhammers but the bits of concrete were wrapped around the steel pieces. The only alternative was blasting. Starting with small charges it was found that bigger and bigger charges were needed. The entire roof of the building was perforated with holes as the bits flew everywhere. I was working for Dad at the workshop about 100 metres away and lumps were landing in our back yard.

Eventually everything was sorted and peace prevailed.

If you go down Tudhoe Street, over the line and turn left at Ventnor Street, then go past the last house on the left, you will see the site of the mill with the concrete foundations still sticking up through the grass.

There were a lot of people employed there over the years who must have lots of stories to tell.

#### Glen Iris Maternity Hospital

There was a big, sprawling weatherboard house at 28 Vesper Street (the road that runs up towards the Catholic Church and the Wagin Hospital).

This was the Glen Iris Maternity Hospital of Mr Harry Sands and his wife.

Mrs Sands was a nurse and a midwife who ran the hospital and Harry looked after the maintenance of the premises. He also had a carrying business.

Many hundreds of Wagin and district people were born at the hospital over the years. I was born there in 1931 and Des Thompson was born there in 1932.

Legend has it that in very cold weather Harry, who was a big portly bloke, would lay in bed while Nurse Sands tucked newborn babies around him to keep them warm. Maybe this was the forerunner of the Humidicribs they use today?

The local doctor was Dr Tinsley Baker, who lived on the corner of Ware and Arnott Streets, over the road from the Wagin Hospital (where Arthur and Wendy Pederick live today).

Dr Baker was on call for Nurse Sands, to assist in a difficult birth or help with a very sick bub. He looked after the Wagin Hospital and his practice also covered Wagin and surrounding districts.

As far as I know Nurse Sands worked alone. I do not know how she managed to look after maybe four or five patients for twenty-four hours a day but she did it and did it well.

#### DON'T FRET OVER A NEW PET – KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Buying a pet is a decision many people make with their hearts as well as their heads, meaning it can be a particularly devastating experience when things go wrong with a new companion.

The issues we hear about can vary: from new pets with significant health issues or not matching their description (such as size or pedigree), to breeders taking upfront deposits for litters that are never born.

That is why we have launched a new campaign to help empower new pet owners to understand how the Australian Consumer Law protects them in the same way as it does for other purchases.

Buying from a shop or breeder (that is a business) entitles you to receive an animal that matches its description, be of acceptable quality, free from significant health issues and have a healthy lifespan relative to the breed or species. Any additional promises made about the pedigree, condition, performance or other characteristics must also be upheld by the trader.

This means if you encounter a genuine pet purchase issue, you may be entitled to receive a remedy (such as financial compensation or reimbursement of out-of-pocket expenses) while still being able to keep the animal.

These protections are unlikely to apply to private sales when someone sells a pet on a oneoff or ad hoc basis, so extra caution is advised if buying this way.

Ask if you can visit where the pet was born and meet its parents to check it has been well cared for, see how big it is likely to grow and what its temperament may be like.

Avoid pet scams – or inadvertently supporting a puppy farm or poor breeding practices – by not buying online if you cannot meet the animal first.

If buying a pet is not for you, consider adopting a new companion from an animal shelter or rescue.

## **Backyard Buddies**

#### **UNDERSTANDING APHIDS**

Aphids are small, soft-bodied, sap sucking insects which belong to the order Hemiptera. Let us examine some unique biological features about aphids to better understand why they are so difficult to control.

 Host plant range: Many species of aphids can feed on a wide range of host plants, which makes it

- difficult to control infestations in mixed plantings. These aphids are referred to as 'polyphagous' and includes the green peach aphid which feeds on a wide range of crops including vegetables, fruit trees, and ornamental plants.
- Rapid reproduction: Aphids can reproduce asexually through a process called parthenogenesis, where females give birth to live young without mating with a male. This allows aphid populations to grow rapidly under favourable conditions, and some species produce 20+ generations a season.
- Developmental plasticity and dispersal: Aphids can produce alates (winged aphids) in response to changes in environmental conditions. A drop in food quality, overcrowding or increased predation pressure can alter their development and produce winged individuals to aid in aphid dispersal.
- **Ant mutualism:** Some species of aphids have a mutualistic relationship with ants, which can protect them from predators and parasitoids. This can make it difficult to control aphid populations without also addressing the ant presence.
- Insecticide resistance: Some aphid populations have developed resistance to commonly used insecticides, which can make control even more challenging.

Understanding these factors can help you develop effective strategies for managing aphids. This may include cultural practices like removing infested plants, biological control methods like introducing natural predators or parasitoids, and careful use of insecticides that are effective against the specific aphid species present.

If you do not recognise the aphid you are trying to control, please report it.

#### WE ARE NOT THE SAME - IS IT EMBEDDED IN OUR MASCULINITY?

Quite often as blokes we have been told to get in touch with our feminine side. Over time this narrative has been part of the language barrier that has put bloke's positive approaches to wellbeing issues and help seeking in reverse.

There are three parts to our health: physical, mental and social/spiritual wellbeing. The latter is where we find our identity, our individuality, our own sense of self, our sense of belonging, our passions and interests and our emotional *context* (not a feminine side!)

We are the same species but putting it simply, men and women have evolved differently. Our DNA is 99.6% similar but it is that 0.4% difference that we need to talk about and address, because it helps explain why blokes have a warrior attitude to life and in turn helps explain why we seek help differently.

There are three main areas of difference that we talk about in the work we do:

#### 1. Communication

- On average, blokes will talk one third less than ladies per day (7,000 words to 21,000 words). This starts from a young age as boys through to men. Anyone with a wife, mother, mother-in-law, daughter, or partner will know this. Ladies, talking is a good thing as it helps address/highlight a whole lot of issues.
- It is perfectly normal for blokes to talk in dot points or even just grunt!

#### 2. Risk-taking

- Blokes are hard wired to take risks from an early age. Some of this is linked to our brain development. The brain development stage for a lady is roughly between the ages of 18 to 20 years, whereas for a bloke it is between the ages of 25 to 28 years (some may say 45 to 50 years!)
- As we get older, we get wiser, but we are still hard wired to take risks.

#### 3. Winning (an important part of the warrior culture)

- The majority (90%) of Aussie men think winning is important (a trait that can be traced back to our true warrior days, hunting for survival);
- An alarming statistic is that 50% of blokes think winning is all that matters. So quite
  often blokes do not take a backward step when it comes to finances, relationships
  and/or business matters.

The importance blokes place on winning explains why a loss event and/or a sense of loss becomes problematic and can be hard to deal with. Combine this with the lack of understanding of our emotions and we may be a ticking time bomb.

As blokes we need to be more aware of our emotions and that it is alright to show them. We will all experience emotional issues throughout our lives. During these times we should openly express our emotions maybe through a hug or a cry and/or use language that is foreign to us, i.e., I am sad, and/or I am struggling here.

Talk to a Mate®!! It is beneficial, and you will realise that it is not just you that may be struggling, there is a lot of other blokes out there feeling the same way.

- 6. Top the apple with the crumb mixture and bake in the oven for 20 minutes or until the crumble is golden brown.
