



HERITAGE GRANT

The Shire has been successful in receiving a Local Government Heritage Consultancy Grant. This grant will enable the Shire to review its Municipal List of Heritage Places, last completed in 1997, and prepare a local Heritage Planning Policy. Both of these documents will assist your Council in planning and responding to future heritage works.

SAFETY FIRST: SHARPS CONTAINERS AND RUBBISH BINS

Sharps containers are being disposed of in domestic rubbish and recycling bins. This is a **significant safety risk** to anyone using the bins or processing waste. Sharps containers MUST be disposed of safely and properly.

SHARPS STORAGE: If you use needles or syringes on a regular basis, please purchase containers for approximately \$8 (small) or \$16 (medium) from your local pharmacy. These containers are the recommended storage units for needles and syringes. FIT Packs have a container within the pack.

SHARPS DISPOSAL: With the lid sealed securely, please return your full container to the local needle and syringe exchange program site at the Wagin District Hospital. Other sites can be found at healthywa.wa.gov.au/Articles/U_Z/Where-to-find-needle-and-syringe-programs-in-WA (or use this QR code).



The Shire has a disposal box for needles at the Tavistock Street toilets and the Wetlands toilets, men's entry side.

COMMUNITY BUDGET REQUESTS 2023/2024 – OPEN NOW!

The Shire of Wagin is inviting Community Groups and Organisations to submit their applications for Council contributions to community projects. Shire contributions of up to \$10,000 in value will be considered by Council as Community Budget Requests for 2023/2024. Applications must be in writing and demonstrate a positive contribution to the Wagin community. Applications over \$10,000 will only be considered on a 'one-third Council Contribution, two-thirds Applicant' Grant Contribution basis. Application forms are available at the Shire of Wagin's Administration Office or via the website at wagin.wa.gov.au. Applications close on Friday the 12th of May 2023. Please note: due to budget timelines, no late submissions can be accepted.

COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Local Government bi-annual elections will take place in October 2023. At each election, a number of council positions are vacated with a call for candidates. In the lead-up to the election, the Shire of Wagin will present information sessions for persons interested in nominating or seeking to understand the election process. Please check the Shire News and Shire of Wagin website regularly.

RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD

All residents are reminded that the Shire of Wagin is now in a Restricted Burning Period (15th of March 2023 – 30th of April 2023). Under the Bush Fires Act 1954 and the Shire of Wagin Fire Management Requirements (as issued with property owner rates notices), **permits to burn are required** which may be obtained from volunteer Fire Control Officers (all rural areas) or the Shire office (all town residents). For further information including burn periods or Fire Control Officers, please refer to the Shire website under Services>Emergency Services.

WAGIN YOUTH CENTRE REVIVAL

The Shire of Wagin and the volunteer committee of Wagin Youth Centre Inc. are bringing back to life the town's much needed youth centre. After more than a decade of cheery operation, the youth centre closed in 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic and has not reopened. This looks set to change, with repair works underway for the main building and a town Youth Engagement Meeting run by the Shire last week.

Julie Christensen, the Shire of Wagin's Community Development Officer, was in attendance at the meeting. With the support of Acting Deputy CEO Donna George, who was previously involved with Wagin Youth Centre in multiple roles since its beginning, Julie has spearheaded the Shire's efforts in getting the Wagin Youth Centre up and running again.

"The Shire and council are strongly in support of the youth centre and youth centre activities", said the Shire of Wagin in a comment to the Wool Press. "Youth services are a key part of the Shire's Strategic Community Plan and it is hoped more opportunities arise in the coming months and years."

This commitment motivated Julie to organise a Youth Engagement Meeting, bringing parents, youth and the Wagin Youth Centre volunteers together. It was held on the 13th of April at the youth centre itself, just one day before Youth Week WA. The youth centre's volunteers had a clean-up busy bee, dusted off the couches and opened the doors.

Eight teenagers and nine adults came together to share ideas. The youth had plenty to say, with Julie pushing past the age gap by sitting on the floor in the middle of the teens and engaging in a friendly chat. There were plenty of suggestions for facilities and services that the youth centre could provide to both entertain and educate the teens, with the committee taking down all ideas for serious consideration.

Julie summarised that the key priorities the youth have for the youth centre are for it to provide a safe space for them to spend time in, and for the volunteers to get the doors open. As if in a vote of confidence towards the youth centre, teens stayed around to hang out or play pool after their part of the meeting was over, despite the venue not being officially set up.

The adults also shared their many ideas and suggestions which the committee are grateful for. All put up their hands to say they will volunteer in some way when the youth centre is open. Some disappointment was expressed that there was a lack of attendance from parents. The committee said they hope more parents will come on board when they see the youth centre is running again.

Their support is essential because multiple supervisors are required during the youth centre's operating hours. Initially, this is expected to be on Saturday afternoons and after school on one weekday. However, the availability of the youth centre is dependent on volunteers.

The youth centre's Vice President Craig Svendsen declared the Shire's meeting a success. He is one of several committee members who met with Julie during the planning process, and like the others quickly gained confidence in her support.

Sharon Diver, a Wagin Youth Centre volunteer of many years, said, "It was good to see the community involvement with youth and the parents coming to the meeting. There was lots of talking about how the youth centre can provide support for the youth of Wagin. It looks positive for the future."

Now the committee's focus turns to ticking off whatever tasks need doing before the youth centre's doors can at last permanently open. The President Geoff Rogers has been focusing on the repair work over the last year, having just fixed the leaking roof. There remains more work to do on the ceiling, and the committee are ensuring the site is once again safe for youth to use, and that they are on top of legislation and policy changes for working with children.

There are still some hurdles to overcome before the Wagin Youth Centre is running again, but everyone involved agrees that with the goal being to support local youth, this project could not be more important. Thanks to the combined effort with the Shire of Wagin the ball is now rolling along quickly. There is hope the youth centre will be open to celebrate its fourteenth birthday on the 4th of July.

The Wagin IGA congratulated the two competition winners, Elijah Richman and Ria Iles. For their hard work, they both won a colourful plush Easter bunny.





SPACE MUSIC – BAROQUE IN THE BUSH

Stars are aligning to create something special in Wickepin this month. A baroque orchestra, NASA scientist, local schoolchildren and Arts Narrogin have come together to bring us *Space Music*, a multisensory performance intended to leave its audience in awe.

Our celestial navigator is Dr Antony Brian. He is a Venusian volcanologist, and that sensational job title means he has mapped part of the planet Venus for NASA. Antony will guide us through a breathtaking selection of



NASA imagery and film depicting our solar system and deep space.

In an accompaniment as astonishingly balanced as the heavenly bodies, the journey will be backed by a full baroque orchestra. This is led by Helen Kruger from Bassendean, the director of Australian Baroque.

Husband and wife, Antony and Helen have combined their visions to elevate the sights of space by pairing it with suitably majestic music. For example, one of the pieces which features Mars, the red planet associated with war, is accompanied by Heinrich Biber's Battalia suite, a 'battle' piece featuring prominent violin.

Helen Kruger and Australian Baroque have toured throughout WA over the last year, performing seventeenth century orchestral music in city and bush. "It's awesome... honestly, the enthusiasm from the audience is just incredible", Helen told the Wool Press when asked how she feels about bringing baroque music to the Wheatbelt.

"There is just so much gratitude for it, like 'We haven't had enough of it with you here, please come again. And make me part of it!' We have had an overwhelming enthusiasm from all directions."

Arts Narrogin has said that the doors of Wickepin Town Hall will open ahead of the two sessions of *Space Music*, inviting the audience to "immerse themselves in the incredible space-themed art installation". This is a display of sculptures built by children from local schools. Inspired by NASA's images of nebulae, moons and planets, the students worked with artist Rachel Wyder to create a galaxy of their own.

Baroque orchestra pieces from the Space Music program were played to the children as they laboured on their creations. Fancifully, this might be said to have imbued their work with the music of the spheres themselves.

Travel through space and time on Saturday the 29th of April within Wickepin Town Hall. The doors open at 3.15pm for the matinee performance from 4pm to 5pm, then again at 6.15pm for an evening session from 7pm to 8pm. There will be a sausage sizzle from 5pm to 7pm. If you live in Wagin or Narrogin, you will be able to take advantage of a free community bus to attend the event. The bus will depart from Wagin Cottage Homes at 2.30pm, giving you time to view the displays, attend the matinee session of *Space Music*, and then return to Earth to enjoy the lunch.



Fitzsimons is a prolific writer and is one of Australia's best-selling non-fiction writers. He has written books about Kokoda, the Shipwreck of Batavia, Breaker Morant, Charles Kingsford Smith, Eureka, Burke and Wills, and Fromelles and Pozieres. Find some of his works below.

BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS

Burke and Wills: The Triumph and Tragedy of Australia's Most Famous Explorers by **Peter Fitzsimons**. This is an adult non-fiction book. Burke and Wills set off on an exploration in 1860, their ambitious quest across the continent. If they succeed, they will become the first European settlers to do so. The explorers battle starvation, extreme desert heat, torrential rains, mutiny and disputes. Although the local indigenous people offered sanctuary, by offering to show the explorers how to live off the land, they are mostly ignored because of bigotry and ignorance.

Charles Kingsford Smith and Those Magnificent Men by **Peter Fitzsimons**. This is an adult nonfiction book. Known to millions of Australians simply as 'Smithy', Sir Charles Kingsford Smith was one of Australia's true 20th century legends. In an era in which aviators were superstars, Smithy was among the greatest. Smithy was the first person to fly across the pacific, he broke the record for the fastest flight from England to Australia, and at one point he held more long-distance flying records than anyone else on the planet.

Kokoda by **Peter Fitzsimons**. This is an adult non-fiction book. Conditions on the track were hellish. Rain was constant, the terrain close to impassable, food and ammunition supplies were practically non-existent and the men constantly battled malaria and dysentery, as well as the enemy. Kokoda was a defining battle for Australia, where a small force of young, ill-equipped young men engaged and experienced unstoppable Japanese force on a narrow, precarious jungle track.

ANZAC Sons: Five Brothers on the Western Front by Allison Marlow Paterson. This is an adult non-fiction book. Mateship, bravery and sacrifice. It is a heartbreaking account of a family

torn apart by war and a mother who never recovered from the tragedy. It is about ordinary people who showed great courage and who suffered immensely in the hope they would preserve a way of life. It is a pledge to never forget.

Memoirs of an Anzac by **John Charles Barrie**. This is an adult non-fiction book. Against his mother's wishes, John Charles Barrie joined the Australian army in 1909. Five years later, he was on his way to Egypt as an officer with the Australian Imperial Force. This book gives us first-hand accounts of Barrie's wounding in Gallipoli on that fateful first Anzac Day. This is not a history textbook, nor is it a series of diary notes and letters. It is a gut wrenching, heartwarming true story that will move you.

ANZACs on the Western Front: The Australian War Memorial Battlefield Guide by Peter Pedersen. This is an adult non-fiction book. Within are rare photographs and documents from the Australian war memorial archive and extensive travel information. Every chapter covers not just the battles, but the often larger-than-life personalities who took part in them. Following a chronological order from 1916 through to 1918, the book leads readers through every major engagement the Australian and New Zealanders fought in and includes tactical considerations and extracts from the personal diaries of soldiers.

The Pacific (Papua Trilogy #3) by **Peter Watt**. This is an adult fiction book. As a war correspondent covering the Second World War, Ilsa Stahl is not afraid to be on the front line. But when her plane goes down in a terrible storm over Papuan waters and she is taken prisoner by the Japanese, she has every reason to be terrified. Particularly as they plan to hand her over to the Germans.

Courtney's War by Wilbur Smith. This is an adult fiction book. Paris, 1939, torn apart by war. Saffron Courtney and Gerhard von Meerbach are thousand miles apart, both struggling for their lives. Gerhard the German war hero, fighter ace, and decorated officer and Saffron the sharp, driven, SOE officer with a record most operatives would die attempting to obtain. This book is highly recommended. It is gritty, gripping and utterly uplifting. For those that love WWII fiction, treacherous spy games, and romantic paradoxes, this will certainly be for you. Gallipoli Street by Mary-Anne O'Connor. This is an adult fiction book. Veronica O'Shay is seventeen and supposed to be learning how to behave in a way that is fitting for a young lady. Instead she would rather be tearing around in a horse and cart having adventures. She has a secret passion for her brother's friend Jack Murphy and what promises to be a future of restraint and compliance. A stunning novel that brings to life the love and courage that formed our Anzac tradition.

The Poppy Wife by **Caroline Scott**. This is an adult fiction book. Until she knows her husband's fate, she cannot decide her own. While many survivors of the Great War have been reunited with their loved ones, Edie's husband Francis has not come home. He is considered 'missing in action', but when Edie receives a mysterious photograph taken by Francis in the post, hope flares. And so, Edie begins to search.

The Daughters of Mars by Tom Keneally. This is an adult fiction book. Naomi and Durance are daughters of a Macleay Valley dairy-farming family. Bound together in complicity by what they consider a crime, when the Great War begins in 1914 they hope to submerge their guilt by leaving for Europe to nurse the tides of young wounded.

The Girl from Munich by **Tania Blanchard**. This is an adult fiction book. It inspired by the true story of Tania's grandparents. In 1943 Charlotte von Klein is a young woman with ground plans. A proud German, she wants to support the fatherland as best as she can. Charlotte's mother would prefer her not to work. Charlotte's father arranges for her to work for the Luftwaffe. This sets Charlotte on a path that will change her life.



LEST WE FORGET

All my life I have had a penchant for history and bygone days, especially about my ancestors and Wagin's history.

Recently a cousin of mine, John Farrow, called in and handed me a bundle of old editions of the Wagin Argus. One that caught my eye was a very dilapidated 1944 edition.

Listed in the paper was a complete list of Wagin residents who had enlisted in the Armed Forces to the 16th of March 1944

I find it difficult to comprehend that a small country town like Wagin could enlist 256 people to all branches of the Armed Forces. Imagine taking 256 able bodied people out of town today. How could the town possibly survive?

There were many more enlistments before the war ended in the 1940s.

There were also many multiple family enlistments. Leading the way were the Holland family with 9 enlistments, Nalders 4, Smiths 4, Dentons 4, Roberts 4, Doigs 4, Kings 4, Gannaways 4, Turnors 3, Painters 3, Wards 3, Quinns 3 and many sets of two individuals.

Casualties to the 16th of March 1944 were: killed in action 8, missing in action 8, wounded 6, prisoners of war (P.O.W.) 22.

Reading through the names listed brought back many

memories of the people and their involvement in the community on their return from the war.

A wonderful response to the war effort from the Wagin population.

Army Releases

More than 8,000 personnel have already been released from the Army for primary production, it has been officially announced.

Figures for the various States up to 18th February, 1944, are: Q.'land 2,176, New. South Wales 2,125, Vis. 2,285, South Aus. 557, West. Aust. 1,047; Tasmania, 500. This gives a total of 8,690 releases.

Gallantry in Action

The first award of the Military Medal to a local soldier in this war has been earned by L/Cpl. Clement John Taylor.

The citation announcing the award

"While our men were endeavouring to get stretcher cases up a steep slope, the enemy launched an unexpected and determined attack on the rearguard of the com-Lance/Cpl. Taylor, who pany. was the Bren gunner, advanced towards the enemy, firing from By his offensive action the hip. and accurate fire he inflicted heavy casualties which resulted in remnants of the attackers withdrawing into the jungle. He greatly assisted in repulsing the attack and saving the company from further casualties."

Clem Taylor is well known to local residents, having been born in Wagin, where he lived with his family for many years. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Horrie Taylor, and latterly had lived in the Dumbleyung district. He was a member of that district's Carnival Football 18 prior to the war. Congratulations, young Clem!

HOW TO AVOID HIRING A SHADY TRADIE

Whether you need a qualified tradesperson to tackle a home project or a handyman for a quick repair, it is important to know the operator you have hired is trustworthy and reliable.

While the majority of tradies do the right thing, we are contacted by disgruntled consumers about the minority that do not.

In the past 12 months, we have received 579 complaints about those working in trades industries, mostly to do with them failing to exercise due care and skill, as well as wrongly accepting payment.

One trader we strongly urge consumers to avoid doing business with is Kyle John Graham Feisst (also known as Chris Johnson or John Miller), an air-conditioning installer and builder of custom vehicle trailers.

Mr Feisst, who advertises under numerous business names on Facebook Marketplace – including Perth Refrigeration & Air Conditioning Repairs; Wat4Now Customs (also spelt Wot4Now Customs); Perth Air Services; and Aim Mechanical – has so far refused to resolve the 42 outstanding complaints we have received from consumers claiming to be owed \$62,000 for incomplete or no work.

To avoid being left in the lurch if a tradie fails to deliver or goes broke, we always recommend only paying a minimal deposit of about 10 per cent or, for larger jobs, negotiate progress payments as stages of the work are completed.

Paying by credit card is a good option as it provides the protection of getting a chargeback if the goods or services are not delivered.

Pricing and overcharging are other common issues reported to us, so always get several quotes to compare prices and avoid any surprises once the job is complete. Ensure tradies are licensed (if required) or accredited by trusted industry bodies and search online for positive or negative reviews. Verify claims by asking to see previous work and speaking to past clients.

Ask to see a certificate of currency for public liability insurance, which will protect you or third parties against any damage the tradesperson may cause.

Conduct a licence search for professions such as an electrician, builder or plumber, on Building and Energy's website at dmirs.wa.gov.au. More information and advice about hiring tradespeople is on our website at consumerprotection.wa.gov.au.

SPOTLIGHT ON HIDDEN FEES

Every cent counts during the current cost of living crisis, so it can come as a shock to discover extra fees or charges have been added to a purchase before checkout, or tacked on to the receipt after paying.

Hidden fees may come in a number of disguises, so it is important to know what to look for and understand your rights to avoid spending more than you had initially planned.

Pre-selected extras are becoming more common as food delivery apps and self-service QR codes in restaurants replace ordering in-person, or when events and flights are booked online. These apps and websites can be set to automatically charge a tip or for other extras, unless the customer removes these options before paying.

Under the Australian Consumer Law (ACL), businesses are allowed to add pre-selected tips and optional charges to your bill – in a practice known as 'drip-pricing' – but only if the additional prices are disclosed at the beginning of the purchasing process.

To avoid accidentally leaving a tip, or being stung for other add-ons, it is important to keep an eye out for any preselected extras included in the total price and deselect anything that is not wanted before making payment.

If you are misled into paying an optional charge, then raise this with the business and request a pro-rata refund to the value of that added charge.

Another common issue we hear about is payment surcharges for simply using your credit, debit or EFTPOS card, rather than cash.

Card surcharges are permitted under the ACL, however the fee must only reflect what it actually costs the business to process the payment, such as bank fees or terminal costs. If a business charges a payment surcharge, it must be able to prove the costs it is based on.

Should a business not accept cash – or fail to provide another way for consumers to pay without incurring a surcharge – the fee must then be included in the total cost.

If you believe a business is breaching the rules on hidden charges, it is best to broach it with them first. Should negotiations fail, contact Consumer Protection on 1300 30 40 54, or consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au.
