

Local Government bi-annual elections will take place on Saturday the 21st of October 2023. At each election, several council positions are vacated with a call for candidates. There are expected to be four vacancies declared this year and nominations will open on Thursday the 7th of September.

ELECTRIC SCOOTERS

There are laws regulating the use of e-rideable devices (e-skateboard, e-scooter, e-wheels, hoverboards, e-unicycle, e-skates) that mean persons aged under 16 are limited to 10 km/h unless you are on private property.

All other use of an e-rideable devices is limited to:

- footpaths, bicycle paths and shared paths to a maximum of 10 km/h;
- a maximum speed of 25 km/h and used only on local roads with no dividing lines where the speed limit is a maximum of 50km/h;
- must wear a helmet; carry no passengers; must have a workable warning device (such as a bell) and must have lights and reflectors when used at night.

Note: the same drug, alcohol and mobile phone usage conditions apply as to other vehicle users.

REGIONAL WA ABANDONED BY LABOR AGAIN

Member for Roe, Peter Rundle, said the Labor Party's submission on adjusting the State's electoral boundaries confirms Labor's contempt for regional WA.

"In two short years the McGowan Government has abolished regional representation in the Upper House, removing eighteen dedicated regional seats, and Labor are now arguing to cut yet another country seat to create a new one in the metropolitan area," Mr Rundle said.

"There can be no mistaking it, Labor is on a mission to silence regional communities and the people who live and work outside of Perth."

Mr Rundle encouraged residents, Local Governments, and key community and industry groups to provide feedback on the suggestions via the Electoral Redistribution Commission.

"We have until the 15th of May to ensure views are put to the Electoral Commission and regional communities need a strong response from people concerned about the risk to representation".

Public suggestions and comments are now closed, until proposed boundaries are published between the 10th and 28th of July 2023, after which objections will be invited.

Mr Rundle said it has become second nature to this arrogant Premier and his Labor Party to attempt to pull the wool over voters' eyes, in this case saying their submission called for minimal change while actually culling a regional seat and significantly altering the remainder.

"It is clear Labor are seeking to carve up the State to suit their own political agenda, rather than do what is best for the people and communities across WA.

"The Labor Government has a track record of attacking regional communities, such as the arbitrary and political decisions to shut down the native forestry industry, ending live sheep export, and decimating Royalties for Regions.

"Labor is an anti-regional Party and the submission to the WA Electoral Commission proves this beyond a shadow of a doubt.

"I urge West Australians to have their say and speak up on this important issue before yet another regional voice is forever silenced."

AUTUMN GRAZING - TEDERA SUNDOWNER

Take a break and see tedera performing in the field. Chat to the experts over drinks and snacks! Tuesday the 23rd of May at 4pm, end of Johnson Road, Wagin (off Ballagin Road).

As part of our Feed 365 grazing demonstration site, we had sown the legume tedera last year and allowed it to establish. We are currently underway with its first grazing and are keen to share this with you and have a chat over drinks and nibbles.

Tedera is a herbacious, perennial, self-pollinating, drought tolerant legume pasture that is highly suited to Mediterranean type climates such as ours here in the wheatbelt.



Its tolerance to drought helps it maintain green leaf matter throughout summer and autumn, as it has the ability to close the leaves at will to conserve moisture and energy. It has an adaptable deep root system providing climate resilience and is a safe, high quality food source. Its true value may lie in extending the green pasture season, reducing the reliance on supplementary feeding.

We weighed sheep on the 9th, prior to putting them on the tedera. We will graze them there for a minimum of two weeks, at which point we will assess the condition of the tedera to determine if they stay another week or not. Once we weigh them coming out of the tedera we can compare that to the performance of other treatment sites from last season and on-going sites this year.

This tedera was sown dry, outside of its usual establishment period as part of our program to allow for ease of timing within the standard farming practice on site.

FERAL PIG PATROL!

The State Natural Resource Management Office project 'Protecting threatened species from feral pig impacts in the wheatbelt' is now underway. The photo below is an example of what most people are not seeing. This is the northern banks of Lake

Queerearup in Woodanilling. The entire area of green soursob weed you can see is actually severely dug up by pigs, in some places up to 2 feet deep. The foreground shows activity from that morning.

This is traditional red-tailed phascogale habitat. With this kind of damage, the insects and other creatures the phascogale relies on for food have had their habitat destroyed. No leaf litter, all the grubs displaced and eaten, etc. No food for the chuditch or other native animals.

There were pigs present when Gen went to establish this monitoring point here, so she had to leave. (In actual fact, there is a pig in this photo in



the distance, but you cannot make it out in the picture.)

Our contractor Daniel Christensen of PYNC Invasive Animal Control is licenced and very experienced with feral pigs in our area. He has been reaching out to landholders about the river systems of the Arthur and Beaufort Rivers and begun the efforts to reduce pig numbers through trapping and shooting. PYNC operates using thermal night vision equipment which allows them a far higher success rate in taking out complete sounders.

It has come as no surprise to us at WWLZ that Daniel has removed 84 pigs in the first month alone, and we have surpassed 100 in early May.

If your property has connection to the river systems or lakes, and you have pigs on site, please get in touch with us and we can get you into the program.

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
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Hi to all our Wagin Library & Gallery patrons and friends.

BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS

We have received a large donation of James Patterson books. Do you like thrillers or do you like a bit of suspense?

The Store by **James Patterson**. This is an adult fiction book. They are always watching. The Store does not just want your money, it wants your soul. When Jacob and Megan Brandeis plan to expose a secretive and evil corporation, the fallout threatens to destroy them. Especially since Jacob and Megan are writing a book that will expose the Store; a forbidden book, a dangerous book.

Out of Sight by **James Patterson**. This is an adult fiction book. You have 48 hours to save your family. The kidnappers leave a message. If she wants to see her husband and daughter alive again, Amy must complete a near impossible task.

Ambush by **James Patterson**. This is an adult fiction book. Only detective Michael Bennett stands in the way of two lethal cartels. The cartels know where he and his family lives. New York's top cop is not the only one at risk. Through twist after twist, he fights to understand exactly how he fits into the killer's plan before he becomes the ultimate victim.

The Kingmaker's Daughter by **Philippa Gregory**. Adult historical fiction. Richard Neville Earl of Warwick is the most powerful magnate in fifteenth-century England. Without a son and heir, he uses his daughters Anne and Isabel, as pawns in his political games. Anne manages her own escape by marrying Richard, Duke of Gloucester, but her choice will set her on a collision course with the overwhelming power of the royal family.

Spare by **Prince Harry**. Spare is a memoir by Prince Harry, Duke of Sussex. Harry details his childhood, and the profound death of his mother as well as his troubled teenage years, and subsequent deployment to Afghanistan with the British Army. He writes about his relationship with his brother and his father. People who have read *Spare* are generally giving mixed reviews, as are the critics.

The King's Curse by **Philippa Gregory**. This is a historical adult fiction book. What is the King's curse? Margaret is the daughter of George, Duke of Clarence, brother of the last two Plantagenet Kings, Edward IV and Richard III. With a new dynasty 'the Tudors' now on the throne of England, Margaret's Plantagenet blood means that she and her family are seen as a threat.

Lady MacBethad by Isabelle Schuler. This is a historical adult fiction book. Lady Macbethad's origins: her noble birth, her pagan roots, her love of country and family. PUT THE BRAKES ON AND CHECK FOR CANCELLATION FEES ON VEHICLE SALES CONTRACTS

Consumer Protection is alerting Western Australian car buyers to check vehicle sales contracts before signing for the correct cancellation fees and terms and conditions.

Motor vehicle dealers in WA have been caught using incorrect or outdated sales contracts which state a cancellation fee that is higher than what is now legally allowed.

Since the 1st of January 2022, the maximum amount motor dealers can charge a consumer who cancels a sales contract is five per cent of the contract's value. Previously, dealers could charge up to 15 per cent as 'pre-estimated liquidated damages' (PELD).

Recently, a motor vehicle dealer in Perth's northern suburbs was issued with two infringement notices after buyers signed outdated contracts which stated the old 15 per cent PELD fee.

Since the reduction came into force, Consumer Protection received 47 complaints in 2022 relating to disputes over fees charged after contract cancellations, which is double the number lodged in 2021. Most complaints have been resolved, with a total of \$28,321.00 being recouped by consumers.

With no cooling off period for vehicle sales in WA, buyers should be certain before signing a vehicle purchase contract to make sure they can afford it, as cancellations can be costly.

If a buyer has paid a deposit and signed a document with the dealer, then this is a vehicle purchase contract. This locks the buyer into purchasing the vehicle, subject to any special conditions and they may not receive a full refund if they change their mind as PELD may be chargeable.

However, dealers should not automatically charge the maximum five per cent fee, as the amount needs to realistically reflect the actual costs of the cancellation to the business. They may need to demonstrate to Consumer Protection how the fee has been calculated if a complaint is received by a consumer.

GIVE SHIPPING CONTAINER SCAMS A WIDE BERTH

Swelling demand for shipping containers is causing Western Australian consumers to be scammed out of their money at a rate of knots.

When items are in high demand yet short in supply, they become easy targets for scammers who know that when people are desperate to buy scarce items, they can forget to 'practice the pause' to consider whether they are being swindled.

According to figures from our WA ScamNet team, 11 victims have been duped out of a whopping \$80,707 already this year – easily eclipsing the \$54,500 recorded in the first five months of 2022, and far exceeding the \$49,000 in total losses for the whole of 2021.

It starts when consumers respond to adverts on social media or elsewhere online for discounted shipping containers, before sending money to websites that turn out to be fake.

Often the scammers steal the business name and ABN information from legitimate companies to appear more convincing, which is exactly what happened recently to GG Plant and Machinery Pty Ltd – an authentic business without an online presence.

As fast as our WA ScamNet team was able to shut down the impersonator sites 'ggplantandequipment.com' and 'ggplantandequipment.com.au', another one popped up in its place ('ggplantequipment.com.au'), highlighting why consumers need to remain vigilant when looking for goods online.

Scammers wave a big red flag when they advertise goods well below market prices and only allow consumers to pay via bank transfer, so we always advise against paying for goods this way.

Instead, only shop on websites that offer secure payment methods such as credit card or PayPal, which allow you to dispute the transaction if the goods are not delivered or something else goes wrong.

If you are looking to buy a shipping container, proceed with caution and remember it is always best if you can inspect the goods in-person. Take the time to find the website or contact details of the legitimate business, then make contact using details you have independently sourced to ascertain whether the offer is genuine.

As the siren sounded over Matera Oval the final scoreline read Wagin 13.7.85 defeat Katanning 5.3.33. Wagin remain on top of the UGSFL C Grade ladder and will next face Narrogin who are also undefeated.
