UNIGRAIN GRANTED \$3 MILLION FOR OAT FLOUR EXPANSION

Unigrain

Unigrain is pleased to announce the award of a \$3 million grant from the Western Australian Government Investment Attraction Fund, to be used as part of a planned \$10 million capital expansion at the Unigrain Wagin oat facility.





Unigrain concludes its tenth year in Wagin in late 2024. Construction of the oat processor's expanded facilities is expected to be completed just ahead of this milestone. Photos by Zach Rayne.

The investment is targeted towards capturing the growing demand for oat product from the oat milk industry across Asia. The project will involve:

- Investment in additional oat milling capacity, allowing the Wagin site to process up to 175,000MT of locally grown milling oats per year; and
- Investment in 30,000MT of annual oat flour production capacity (i.e., the primary input used for the manufacture of oat milk).

The business' investment in oat flour capacity will support at full capacity the production of over 300 million litres of oat milk across our customer base. Once complete, it will represent the single largest oat flour production site in the Asia Pacific region.



The Election will be conducted as voting in person elections. Nominations for these vacancies open on **Thursday 31 August** and **close at 4.00pm on Thursday 7 September 2023**.

To nominate, candidates are required to lodge with the Returning Officer:

- a completed nomination on the prescribed form which has been signed and witnessed (forms are available from all local government offices and the WA Electoral Commission).

PUBLIC NOTICE: STOP PUPPY FARMING CONSULTATION – OPEN NOW

WA's local governments are encouraged to have their say in the next stage of reforms to support the objectives of the **Dog Amendment (Stop Puppy Farming) Act 2021**.

A three-month consultation opened on the 17th of August 2023, encouraging feedback on a discussion paper on the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) website [QR code].



Responses will inform the development of:

- draft regulations;
- specifications and functionality in the Centralised Registration System;
- resources needed by local government to implement and enforce legislative requirements.

DLGSC is also seeking feedback from community members, animal rehoming services, vet practices and other stakeholders.

You are encouraged to provide your feedback by completing the online survey, which can be accessed with this QR code.



The consultation closes on the 17th of November 2023.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS: ROLL CLOSE 5PM FRIDAY 25 AUGUST

You may be eligible to be enrolled to vote in the following in-person Local Government Elections on Saturday the 21st of October 2023 if you live in or are an owner or occupier of rateable property in the district of the Shire of Wagin.

Residents

You are automatically enrolled to vote if you are on the State Electoral Roll as at 5pm Friday the 25th of August 2023. If you are not already on the State Electoral Roll but meet the eligibility criteria, or if you have changed address recently, you must complete an enrolment form.

Enrolment Forms

You can enrol or update your details online, or download an enrolment form, via the Western Australian Electoral Commission website at elections.wa.gov.au/enrol or using the QR code. Forms are also available



from the Australian Electoral Commission at <u>aec.gov.au</u>. Enrolments and updates must be completed and received by 5pm Friday the 25th of August 2023.

Non-Residents Owners and Occupiers

If you are a non-resident owner or occupier of rateable property in the Shire of Wagin and are on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll, you are eligible to enrol to vote. If you are not on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll and own or occupy rateable property in the Shire of Wagin, you may be eligible to enrol to vote. This applies if you were last on the electoral roll for the Shire of Wagin prior to May 1996 and have owned or occupied rateable property in the district continuously since this time. Please contact your local government for details. Owners of land who were on the last Local Government roll continue to retain that status, until they cease to own rateable property to which the enrolment relates. Occupiers do not have continuous enrolment and should contact the Shire of Wagin to confirm their enrolment status. To be eligible to enrol as an occupier, you will need to have a right of continuous occupation under a lease, tenancy agreement or other legal instrument for at least the next three months following the date of the application to enrol.

Electoral Forms – Non-Resident Owners and Occupiers Only

Enrolment forms can be obtained from local governments and must be lodged with the Acting Chief Executive Officer by 5pm Friday the 25th of August 2023. Further information can be obtained from the Shire of Wagin, 2 Arthur Road Wagin, phone 9861 1177.

COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Local Government bi-annual elections will take place on Saturday the 21st of October 2023. At each election, several council positions are vacated with a call for candidates. There are expected to be four vacancies declared this year and nominations will open on Thursday the 31st of August and close 4pm Thursday the 7th of September.

To speak with a current councillor about this important role, get contact details by visiting the shire website and browsing to $Council \rightarrow Elected$ Members, using the QR code or calling the shire office on 9861 1177.

THE HOMETOWN ADVANTAGE: AGING WELL - BACKGROUND

Caring for aged residents has been a topic of conversation in Wagin in recent months. The threat of our town's beloved aged care facility, Waratah Lodge, closing has riveted our attention. This has served to raise awareness that the best option for older people to live their best life in Wagin is to have them living at home for as long as possible. For this to work, a village approach needs to be adopted.

The old saying, "It takes a village to raise a child", could be expanded to: "It takes a village to care for its elderly citizens".

Wagin Home Care, funded by the Australian government and administered by the Shire, beautifully cares for and provides support services to those with limited ability to get out and about, to enable them to live independently in their own community. Their services include housekeeping, meal preparation, social support, transport to appointments, and personal care.

Government legislation in aged care, to be in place in 2025, will see significant changes to the scene, especially regarding Care Packages.

"Supporting seniors to remain living in their own home and local community helps to build strong, vibrant communities that care and support each other", says the Seniors Strategic Planning Framework, Government of Western Australia Department of Local Communities.

Aging better and maintaining functional capacity can reduce disease and disability in older age, according to research undertaken by Edith Cowan University. Which begs the question, "What kind of investment are we prepared to make into our aging town's future?"

How do we reduce agism (dependency and vulnerability) as our population is living longer? A leader in this field is Helen Morton.

Developing the long list of advantages for residents staying in their own homes longer was pioneered in Pingelly by several people, including Helen Morton. Early steps included establishing a 'Virtual Village', in which locals were surveyed as to what services they needed and in what areas they could volunteer. The object was to raise awareness for the assets that existed and what needs were unmet.

There are measurable direct effects – physical, mental, social, and economic – of properly applied care and resources. Our towns are diminished if we fail to meet the needs of our older citizens. Life satisfaction must be addressed as a valid concern.

In the model Pingelly adopted, there are significant financial benefits for the local community. The first fifteen clients (at care levels 2, 3, and 4) brought over \$500,000 into the community each year. "That's staggering, the equivalent of a new business starting up in town", said Peter Kenyon, empowering builder for small towns.

The issues are complex – workforce shortages, education and training, administration, gaps in funding, limitations, access to services, rural dwellings, regulatory compliance, clinical governance, client choice, etc. – and require focused thinking.

How do you build a local workforce to deliver this? How do you launch this? How do you administer it? How can you run concurrent Home Care and other methods of service delivery? How do we harness the good we have and improve to fill the gaps?

How do we bring together all the wonderful but fragmented work being undertaken?

To answer these questions and any others of local concern, Helen Morton is coming to Wagin on Thursday the 31st of August, 2pm to 4pm in Wesley Hall. She hopes to meet with care givers, interested parties, shire councillors, the aged, the children of the aged, concerned citizens.

Event planner Wendy Pederick said, "Helen has applied herself to making positive changes in a field that is of interest to every concerned small-town family. She knows what can be done to improve the landscape and has the data to tell the story."

There is huge advantage in people being able to live as long as possible in the town of their choice. The sustainability of happier residents and improved local capacity is possible. Anyone with an interest is urged to attend the informative meeting.

THE HOMETOWN ADVANTAGE: AGING WELL - EVENT DETAILS

The Community of Wagin is a community that cares for each other. That's the reason all of us, older or not, have an interest in what happens to all citizens.

Key presenter at the Hometown Advantage Information session, to be held on Thursday the 31st of August in Wesley Hall on Ranford Street, is Helen Morton of Pingelly.

The afternoon, funded by Rural Aid, which is passionate about strengthening country towns to be more resilient and connected, starts at 2pm. Crammed into the two hours will be an outline of just what constitutes a virtual village (it's not a place; it's a concept), the story of Pingelly's Staying in Place initiative, and a look at the elements necessary to enable older people to stay at home longer. Once identified, these elements can be worked towards by the community.

The program will include the opportunity for Q&A, networking and interaction. Participants will be asked for their reactions to the virtual village model and openness to a co-operative approach to home care service delivery in Wagin.

Helen grew up in Frankland, went to high school in Albany, lived on a sheep station in Meekatharra and Sandstone, farmed in Narrikup, Pingelly and Wandering; her years of country living. Trained in occupational therapy, she held executive management roles in WA Health including Director for the Wheatbelt, Midwest and Gascoyne health regions. This was followed by twelve years in state parliament, five of which as Minister for Mental Health, Disability and Child Protection. Helen sees all this as preparation to assist in designing and proving that a new approach to enabling older people living in small, isolated, rural, and remote areas of Australia to stay living in their own homes, in their own communities until the end of life, is possible.

Afternoon tea and creche facilities will be provided.

At its core, the debate about caring for our older residents must empower them with decision-making capacity over their own lives. That's the real value and must be core to any movement forward. This community co-operative approach to aged care is taking over from the institutional care of the 1980s and the client-focused care of the 2000s. Community engagement is more fulfilling because it strengthens and enriches community.

DEBATE UPCOMING TO REPEAL CULTURAL HERITAGE ACT

The Opposition has been briefed on key changes that will come into effect following the WA Labor Government's spectacular backflip of their botched cultural heritage laws.

Member for Roe, Peter Rundle, was briefed on the Aboriginal Heritage Legislation Amendment and Repeal Bill 2023, and said the Bill would restore the Aboriginal Heritage Act 1972, with key amendments.

"Just six weeks after their implementation, WA Labor have bowed to public pressure and announced their government will scrap their botched cultural heritage laws", Mr Rundle said.

"Whether you emailed, called, signed petitions or showed up to Katanning or Parliament, I would like to thank you for voicing your very real concerns at WA Labor's policy.

"Your voice is your power and, in a state where our voices can often be drowned out by Labor, you persisted and were ready for the fight."



Mr Rundle also said the Bill will repeal WA Labor's botched 2021 heritage act, with debate set to get underway in the coming weeks.

"The legislation from 1972 will undergo modifications to prohibit the inclusion of 'gag' clauses in agreements involving Native Title parties, and will grant Native Title parties the ability to review Ministerial decisions.

"Importantly, the Government have also promised to cover the cost of land surveys for ten years, which will not be compulsory for landholders.

"These matters will be discussed in Parliament over the next few weeks. I strongly encourage people to get in touch with me to ensure your questions and concerns are raised."

Leader of the Opposition and Leader of the Nationals WA, Shane Love, said the Premier still has questions to answer.

"WA Labor reeks of a government which listens to the polls, not to the people," Mr Love said.

"Only a matter of weeks ago, Premier Cook said his laws were 'not radical' and were 'ready to go'. Now, he says the laws 'unintentionally caused stress, confusion and division in the community'.

"Questions still need to be answered by the Premier: will regional Western Australia be treated with more respect in the future, and, after all the disturbance and amendments to the 1972 Act, will landowners be able to go back to business as usual?

"After weeks of ignoring a 30,000-person strong petition, overcapacity at every Government run education session, dozens of representations, labelling opponents as 'racist' and 'dogs returning to their vomit', and calls for the Opposition to 'get on the right side of history', WA Labor have retreated.

"It is because of your hard work WA Labor Government ate its words and crumbled.

"What West Australians deserve now is more than an apology – we deserve a new Government. Our communities will not survive another term of Labor."

FURTHER INFORMATION:

A Bill to repeal WA Labor's botched Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act 2021 was introduced to Parliament on Wednesday the 9th of August, called the Aboriginal Heritage Legislation Amendment and Repeal Bill 2023 [QR code].



The Government has said it will not ram this legislation through Parliament and thwart parliamentary process, as it did in its botched 2021 Act. Therefore, debate will commence on Wednesday the 30th of August 2023.

Some key features of the modified 1972 Act will include:

- The Aboriginal Cultural Material Committee and the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Council will be replaced by the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Committee.
- The relevant Native Title party will now have a right of review over Ministerial approvals.
- Gag clauses will now be banned in agreements with the Native Title party.
- Landholders will now have to notify the Minister of new heritage discovered on their land.
- The Minister for Aboriginal Affairs must publish decisions online.
- The Premier may call for a decision review if they consider the application of State or regional importance.

The Government has also promised to cover the cost of land surveys for ten years. It will not be compulsory for landholders to undertake a survey.

These matters will be subject to discussion in Parliament in coming weeks, as will the integrity of the commitments from the WA Labor Government to undo the damage it has caused.

BE HEARD: BECOME A LOCAL GOVERNMENT COUNCILLOR

Members of the Western Australian community are being urged to consider nominating for the upcoming local government elections, to be able to influence the decisions being made that potentially impact the lives of thousands of residents.

Local Government Minister David Michael said, by standing for local council, candidates will make a valuable contribution to local democracy by putting forward policies and highlighting issues they believe are important to them and their community.

"Councillors play a major part in representing the interests of their ratepayers and residents, making decisions to reflect the needs and wishes of their community and shaping policies that align with a council or shire's future vision and direction", said Local Government Minister David Michael.

"The role of a councillor is an important one – they lead and guide the community, decide how money is spent and propose ideas to make their part of the State a great place to live."

A promotional campaign by the Cook Government, in partnership with the WA Local Government Association, will aim to promote diversity in local government representation with the hope it will result in greater involvement of a wider range of candidates from Aboriginal and multicultural backgrounds, as well as young people and people with disability.

The Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) has also teamed up with the Youth Affairs Council of WA to conduct a campaign specifically targeting the 18 to 24 age group to boost the interest of young people in getting involved in local government.

"It's important that local councils are representative of the people they serve. That's why we need people of all backgrounds and life experiences to have a voice and put their hand up to serve their community", said Michael.

"Women are particularly under-represented in local governments, so I would encourage more women to get involved so we can achieve a better gender balance on councils."

To provide incentives for people to nominate, the local government reform package includes measures to support a diverse range of people who serve on councils, such as new parental leave entitlements, and changes to enable local governments to pay superannuation and educational allowances to council members.

Nominations for the local government elections to be held on the 21st of October will open on Thursday the 31st of August and close on Thursday the 7th of September 2023.

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"When I was 25, I was elected to the City of Stirling where I served for 12 years, including as Deputy Mayor, and I am still proud of the projects and service improvements achieved while I was on council. I speak from personal experience when I say that the job of a councillor can be very rewarding", said Michael.

"If you are considering running in this year's local government elections, I encourage you to lodge a nomination before the closing date, and make a valuable contribution that will be beneficial to you and your community."

WHEATBELT GETTING \$148M JOB-CREATION BOOST

As part of this, Unigrain based in Wagin will receive \$3m for a manufacturing facility to produce oat flour. Future Energy Australia in Narrogin will receive \$4.7m towards a renewable diesel biorefinery at the Narrogin Future Energy Park.

"This announcement demonstrates the Cook Labor Government's commitment to regional development in Western Australia", said Agricultural Region MLC Shelley Payne.

"This funding is a significant boost for the Narrogin and Wagin communities, creating employment and economic growth opportunities."

The 40 successful recipients will share \$148.4 million in grant funding, with projects spanning eight priority sectors: defence industries; energy; health and medical life sciences; international education; mining and mining equipment, technology, and services; primary industries; space industries; and tourism, events, and creative industries.

CLUBS TO LIGHT UP IN DUMBLEYUNG AND WILLIAMS

Thirteen Club Night Lights Program (CNLP) projects will receive \$629,000 following the February 2023 small grants funding round, including the Shires of Dumbleyung and Williams.

The small grants program enables community organisations, local governments and sport and recreation clubs to apply for and receive funds to support the development of high-quality infrastructure and environments for sport and recreation throughout Western Australia.

The Shire of Dumbleyung will receive \$26,761 to upgrade lighting at Dumbleyung and Kukerin ovals. The Shire of Williams has been granted \$3,366 to upgrade the lighting in the ram shed at the Williams sports ground precinct.

"Sport in regional communities is such an important part of our lives. The Club Night Lights Program is a great way to ensure sport can be played at any time of the day", said Agricultural Region MLC Shelley Payne.

"It is great to see regional communities such as Dumbleyung, Kukerin and Williams will reap the benefits of this funding."

The remaining \$386,000 is allocated across a further ten metropolitan and regional projects to upgrade lighting at various sporting and recreation facilities.

The Cook Labor Government's valuable support is providing funding to help local governments and sporting clubs keep Western Australians physically active and participating in sport and recreation opportunities.

"The Community Sporting and Recreation Facilities Fund and Club Night Lights Program provide financial assistance to community groups to help them provide good quality and well-utilised facilities", commented Sport and Recreation Minister David Templeman.

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

MY UNCLE ERNEST

Hello everybody. It has been a little time since I wrote my last Real Australian Story. Having said this, I never run out of things to write about. It is all about the correct timing. So let us begin. I can remember as a small child, my mother always used to remind me of her opinion that times change, but essentially people do not. My understanding is that, as from the fact we are all cast from the same human DNA structure, it follows suit that our basic structure remains the same, so only the times change.

I believe most people have heard the following terminology. I can remember the Good Old Days. For me personally, the day that has just passed has always been a good old day. Albeit, each day presents its own challenges, some more difficult to sort out than others.

Even though we are in a different structure in the ways of technology from the days of my youth, I often ask myself, are we better off? I like to keep my life pretty basic in the way of needs. Another matter is today's current employment criteria. Growing up in Steel City (Newcastle NSW), it did not matter what your station was in the way of employment, job security was the key governing factor. Loyalty to your employee was the just return.

In previous stories, I wrote about my passion for trains and public transport in general. Back in the 1960s there was a show on television about a train guy called, from memory, Casey Jones. My cobber, who lived down the road from my house, and I were right onto this show. Train driving was going to be my gig. But as I grew older, I had a new hero: my uncle Ernest.

Both my parents had quite a few siblings, so there was no shortage of relatives to visit, and in return they would visit us. Growing up, my mother did not hold a license to drive, so you guessed it, public buses were the preferred mode of transport. I had visited my uncle Ernest and aunty Edith many times. They were what I would call just everyday Australians. In the big scheme of things, nothing really stood out to differentiate them from anybody else.

Uncle Ernest wore basic clothes, just like everyone in my family. Old Crosby slippers. Those slippers will be the focus of another story. Usually, he had a roll up cigarette in the process of being smoked or relit, as they usually went out if you did not keep puffing away. But, and I will say but, uncle Ernest was a public bus driver.

Steel City was a pretty big place. To cater for all the suburbs, there were many bus routes mapped throughout the city. Occasionally I would board a bus that my uncle Ernest was in charge of. The guy morphed into, in my opinion, a superhero. Gone were the basic threads and Crosby slippers, replaced by his drivers uniform. He always wore shorts the year through; had slicked back hair, usually with a product called, from memory, Brylcream; always the guy wore brown tinted polaroid sunglasses; immaculate black polished shoes with long black socks; well-tanned and in total control of his situation.

No more train driving aspirations for me. Driving a bus was, to me, going to be the goods. Over the years I have driven just about everything that graces our public roads, but have never driven a public bus. Though I do often think about my uncle Ernest.

He loved driving public buses. It showed in the way he handled the passengers, always with respect. He had a huge responsibility, but that was how it was, you just did the job to the best of your ability. My uncle did not have to be told he was good at his job. He knew it. In return for being proficient at his work, and this went hand in hand with being loyal, my uncle knew that with these factors combined his employment was secure. I often wonder how he handled being in a retirement situation, but that is another part of life's journey.

In closing, as always, I hope everyone enjoys this real Australian story. I guess times have changed, but my own personal values and goals have not. I love this country we all call Australia and will continue to do so. I would like to finish by saying, as always, go well, be safe, and best regards. Thank you for reading this story.

KEEP YOUR WITS WHEN BUYING TICKETS

Live sport and music lovers will be spoilt for choice in the coming months, as Western Australia gets set to host to a slew of major international events.

Competition for tickets to the likes of the FIFA Women's World Cup, Coldplay and P!NK has been fierce, so it's never been more important for WA consumers to stay on the ball when trying to secure their own seat or spot.

We have no doubt ticket scalpers and scammers will come crawling out of the woodwork to offer tickets on resale sites or online classifieds that either don't exist or are at illegally inflated prices.

That's why your safest option is to always buy tickets through the authorised ticketing agent, or via its authorised resale site if you miss out.

Before snapping up tickets to any event, it's important to check whether they come with a 'resale restriction.' If they do, it means you cannot sell them for more than a 10 per cent mark-up and you may have issues transferring them into a different name should you no longer be able to attend.

When advertising tickets with resale restrictions, resellers must also remember to include the original ticket cost (including booking fees) and details of the seat row and number.

Event goers can rest assured that when major concerts or sporting competitions are advertised, our compliance officers proactively monitor resale sites and online classifieds for fake tickets and to ensure genuine resale tickets comply with the legislation, in addition to investigating complaints about misconduct.

Following one such investigation earlier this year, Consumer Protection issued five \$2,000 infringement notices to scalpers who illegally advertised tickets to the Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC 284) event for up to 430 per cent more than they originally paid for them.

We want consumers to help us stop ticket scalpers and scammers in their tracks. The first thing to do if you've bought a ticket that doesn't comply with the law is to ask for a refund from the supplier or individual seller. Failing this, you may be able to seek a chargeback from your bank if you paid by credit card.

If you spot resale tickets exceeding 10 per cent mark-up, or believe you've seen fake tickets, contact Consumer Protection on 1300 30 40 54 or consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au.



Backyard Buddies

Your monthly guide to pests, weeds and diseases

BIOSECURITY BLITZ

Wherever you live and whatever the size of your backyard, you can help protect WA's agriculture, forests, and natural ecosystems into the future.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development's (DPIRD's) Biosecurity Blitz is back in 2023, with a special focus on reporting backyard pests and diseases.

The Biosecurity Blitz aims to protect Western Australia's backyards and agricultural industries from an increasing number of exotic threats, such as the recent incursions of polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB), myrtle rust and Queensland fruit fly (Qfly).

By checking your backyard for pests and diseases and reporting what you find, you'll learn about these organisms and help protect your garden, regional biodiversity and the local food and nursery industries in Western Australia.

Every report helps! Your report helps to increase the likelihood that serious pests and diseases will be detected early, providing the best opportunity to eradicate or contain them.

If your report turns out to be a common pest, that data may be used to support WA's export trade.

Look, **snap**, **report**. This year the Biosecurity Blitz runs from the 16th of October to the 16th of November. That's 31 days to look for, take a photo of, and send in a report of every pest and disease in your backyard.

To participate in the Blitz:

- register at agric.wa.gov.au/biosecurity-blitz
- download the free MyPestGuide® Reporter app
- check your backyard for pests and diseases
- take photos of any pests or disease signs you find
- report using the app or online at <u>mypestguide.agric.wa.gov.au</u>.

Every report gets a response. Let's see what's in your backyard! You will receive a response to your report and a weekly email with pest identification and information on priority plant pests and activities you can do in your backyard.




