

PUBLIC NOTICE: STOP PUPPY FARMING CONSULTATION – OPEN NOW

WA's local governments are encouraged to have their say in the next stage of reforms to support the objectives of the **Dog Amendment (Stop Puppy Farming) Act 2021**.

A three-month consultation opened on the 17th of August 2023, encouraging feedback on a discussion paper on the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) website [QR code].

Responses will inform the development of:

- draft regulations;
- specifications and functionality in the Centralised Registration System;
- resources needed by local government to implement and enforce legislative requirements.

DLGSC is also seeking feedback from community members, animal rehoming services, vet practices and other stakeholders.

You are encouraged to provide your feedback by completing the online survey, which can be accessed with this QR code.

The consultation closes on the 17th of November 2023.

COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Local Government bi-annual elections will take place on Saturday the 21st of October 2023. At each election, several council positions are vacated with a call for candidates. There are expected to be four vacancies declared this year and **nominations will open on**

Thursday the 31st of August and close 4pm Thursday the 7th of September.




PUBLIC NOTICE: CHANGE IN OCTOBER ORDINARY MEETING OF COUNCIL DATE

"Whether it's The Big Banana, The Big Pineapple, or Canberra's very own Big Swoop, the best 'Big Things' celebrate the character of our communities and give visitors a reason to smile and pop in for a visit.

"While the Mint's 'Big Things' coins may be of standard size, the memories they evoke loom large," Dr Leigh said.

Aussies revealed the three most important factors for a good 'Big Things' visit: size, condition, and lots to do onsite. 'Big Things' that have all three do a great job of attracting people to regional towns.



University of Sunshine Coast lecturer and expert on Australia's 'Big Things' Dr Amy Clarke said, "'Big Things' can be a one-trick pony if there isn't something else to do onsite. Once you've got a photo, the chances of going back are low, unless there's plenty of additional fun to be had. And while people often associate 'Big Things' with the 1980s, when a lot of them were built, we're still building more 'Big Things' today."

Aussies told Australia Post what they'd love to see in their hometowns with some specific requests to consider, including¹:

- A big black swan in Perth
- A big gold nugget or pan in Ballarat
- A big surfboard on the Gold Coast
- A big quokka on Rottnest Island in Western Australia
- A big football or a big coffee in Melbourne
- A big Tassie tiger for Tasmania







REGIONAL EVENTS FUNDING 2024-25 APPLICATIONS OPEN

The WA Government will provide up to \$1.1 million in funding for regional events across WA as part of the 2024-25 Regional Events Scheme (RES).

The annual RES funding supports smaller and developing events in regional WA, with money available to attract visitors to WA's regions and stimulate local economies.

"Our regions have so much to offer communities and tourists alike. This scheme provides an important boost to regional event holders, and supports a diverse calendar of events across Western Australia to become bigger and better", said Tourism Minister Rita Saffioti.

"These events provide a time-specific reason for people to come and visit our State's stunning regions and bring communities together, growing regional economies and job opportunities.

"Regional events also play such an important role in showcasing the unique destinations WA has to offer and creating vibrancy in local communities."

The funding also provides \$250,000 for the Regional Aboriginal Events Scheme (RAES) to support events that showcase and celebrate Aboriginal activities and experiences through the leadership and participation of Aboriginal people.

Event holders can apply for funding amounts between \$5,000 to \$40,000 for events to be held between the 1st of July 2024 and the 30th of June 2025, with applications open until Sunday the 17th of October 2023.

"Regional events are so important to help bring our community together as well as attracting tourists to our regions", commented Agricultural Region MLC Shelley Payne.

"This funding is a great opportunity for organisations, individuals or Shires to help improve the vibrancy of regional WA by holding a community event with State Government support.

"I look forward to attending some of the funded events in the future."

Last year's scheme saw 65 regional events around the State awarded funding, including the Ravensthorpe Wildflower Show and Spring Festival, the Katanning Harmony Festival and

the 2022 Southern Art Trail and the Bloom Festival which spanned several towns across the Great Southern region.

"Regional events are back on the calendar across all regions of Western Australia, celebrating each community's unique culture, art and cuisine, and delighting visitors and locals", said Regional Development Minister Don Punch.

"It doesn't matter what you're into, across the State, throughout the year, there's sure to be an event that will excite and entertain the whole family."

RUNDLE SLAMS PM VISIT TO WA AS 'HOLLOW'

Member for Roe, Peter Rundle, has slammed the Prime Minister's visit to Western Australia this week, labelling the visit as 'hollow'.

Mr Rundle said the Prime Minister's trip reeks more of a tax-payer funded holiday which has done little to quell concerns of the people of Western Australia.

"Anthony Albanese has come to Western Australia with the naivety of a tourist and has done nothing to address the issues impacting our community," Mr Rundle said.



"The Prime Minister's rhetoric was ignorant at best, claiming the "Agricultural, forestry and fisheries [are] areas where WA already sets the world standards in quality".

"This is completely at odds with Labor's live export bans, skilled migrant caps, native forestry bans, and senseless attacks on fishing, all which will have massive flow on effects for the electorate of Roe.

"The Prime Minister clearly wasn't briefed on the anti-primary industries and anti-regional agenda his WA Labor colleagues are running.

"The Prime Minister has also failed to address the elephant in the room – will the Federal Labor Government implement their own cultural heritage legislation which infringes upon private property rights?"

Mr Rundle also emphasised the Prime Minister failed on every level to understand the realworld impact of Labor policies on Roe's local industries.

"Our industries are the backbone of our nation's economy, and the Federal Labor Government's decision to ban live sheep exports and cap skilled migrant intake will tear apart our businesses and livelihoods.

"What's more, Minister for Agriculture Murray Watt has still refused to put feet on the ground with a farmer and witness firsthand the detrimental effect his government's ban on live sheep export is having on small businesses in WA.

"To come to WA and refuse to front farmers grappling with the impending live export ban is a real kick in the guts for our communities – it's weak.

"This is his second trip to WA now where he has failed to front the people whose livelihoods he is stripping away – he's happy enough to speak at a luncheon in Perth, but not to leave the shield of the city and attend the Dowerin Field Days, the largest agricultural event in the state.

"One thing we know for sure about Labor Governments is that if you're out of sight you're out of mind, and our primary industries and regions do not matter to Labor."

Leader of the Opposition and Leader of the Nationals Shane Love reminded people the Federal Labor Government has not made any commitment to keep their hands off our fair share of the GST. "If Labor won't protect our industries, pushing bans and cutting skills, how can we trust them to protect our GST?"

"Anthony Albanese treats WA as a 'nice to have' and if he fails to see the importance of our economy and our productivity to the nation, he will be punished at the ballot box.

"Roger Cook thinks he needs an embassy to make the Prime Minister pay attention – the Nationals think we need a new Government."

LABOR CAVES TO OPPOSITION'S CALLS FOR REGULATIONS

The Opposition's calls for the WA Labor Government to release their regulations to the Aboriginal Heritage Legislation Amendment and Repeal Bill 2023 have finally been heard, with Premier Roger Cook conceding defeat and committing to provide the regulations before debate commences.

Member for Roe Peter Rundle said the regulations would provide vital detail of how the 1972 Act would operate.

"The regulations will contain some of the most vital detail of how this legislation will operate, including timeframes for the Minister to make a decision, detail of offences and fee schedules.

"As the party of common sense, the Nationals WA kept up the pressure, pushing WA Labor into conceding defeat and committing to provide the regulations.

"This will allow the Opposition to properly scrutinise the Act as we work to prevent a repetition of Labor's botched heritage legislation – our communities deserve clarity and assurance they will be able to do business.

"As Labor's regulations become available, rest assured my colleagues and I will continue the fight and represent the private property rights of the people of Roe."

The WA Labor Government's overdue admission comes after the Leader of the Opposition and Leader of the Nationals Shane Love called on the Premier, Attorney-General and Minister for Aboriginal Affairs to stop history repeating itself and commit to providing the regulations.

"Last Question Time, the WA Labor Government was asked on more than one occasion to provide the Opposition with the key regulations which would amend the 1972 cultural heritage laws," Mr Love said.

"For weeks, Minister for Aboriginal Affairs Tony Buti and WA Labor went for cheap 'oneliners' and evaded any commitment.

"While Labor MPs scorn genuine community concern, the fact the regulations have still not been provided is no laughing matter, risking a repeat of Labor's botched ACH Act.

"Labor has now seen the writing on the wall and has been forced to see sense, with Premier Cook conceding and committing to provide the regulations before debate commences later this year.

DO YOU KNOW WHAT THEY'RE VAPING?

Wagin District High School, like many other schools, has seen a recent increase in young people vaping.

E-cigarettes, or 'vapes', are not safe for young people. They come in many shapes and sizes and can be hard to spot as they can look like everyday items including highlighters, pens or USB memory sticks.

Key vaping facts:

 Many vapes contain nicotine. Nicotine can cause long-lasting negative effects on young people's brain development, including impaired learning ability and altered mood, and can increase the risk of depression and anxiety.

- Vapes can contain the same harmful chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray, which can lead to serious lung diseases.
- Young people who vape are three times as likely to take up smoking cigarettes.

It's important to take the time to talk to your child about the risks of vaping. Try to start the conversation in a relaxed easy-going way, and remember your goal is to have a conversation, not deliver a lecture. Importantly, get the facts from the Department of Education by using this QR code.

BOOTS, SHOES & POLISH

In the vicinity of the last couple of months I received a bag of assorted goods from a friend of mine. Like myself, he likes to recycle goods that are deserving of a new life. Upon opening the bag, to my surprise there was an old pair of Grosby wool type lined slippers or, if you like, moccasins. I may have mentioned these slippers in my last story. I have no idea whether the company still makes shoes or not. When I finish writing this story I will investigate further.

As a young guy growing up, it was a pretty big affair receiving new shoes of any description. The television back then, as now, had advertising segments. I can always remember the advertisements for shoes. Like the Grosby brand: I seem to remember a cartoon dog giving a spiel about why everyone should be wearing said shoes. The dog would sign off by saying something like, "Grosby shoes, they are great mate", then give a caricatured woof bark. The other shoes that I can remember were Bata school shoes, and for the more discerning gentleman, a brand I believe called Julius Marlow.

During my time of growing up, as mentioned it was a pretty big event to receive new shoes. My late mother would take me off to the local shoe store. The salesperson would sit you down, size up your foot with a special device, and usually account for the fact that the new shoes would need to accommodate the growth cycle that you would naturally go through. Once fitted, they were wrapped up in tissue like paper, put into the branded shoe box, then you were on your way. But this was just the beginning.

In my growing years, my mother always insisted that good shoes should be taken care of. After all, they had to last at least a year before a new set was purchased for me. In our laundry (attached to our house) was a special bag of numerous shades of Kiwi brand shoe and boot polishes. Included in the bag was an assortment of brushes: one to apply the polish, one to take the polish off, then finally polish cloths to give the final sheen. Usually this occurred once a week. To me, nothing looks as good as a freshly polished pair of boots or shoes.

I must admit, I am still pretty obsessed with all things footwear. It all started from not only school shoes. Around the mid-sixties my older brother Darrell bundled me off into his FE Holden Utility, took me into Newcastle city itself, and as a surprise gift bought me a brandnew pair of elastic sided boots from a saddlery shop. I had no idea that this was the purpose of our outing. Like my brother, I just loved those boots.

I was somewhat younger than my older brothers, but to me it was of little consequence. They were good guys to be involved with. My next oldest brother to me is called Raymond. He would usually, on a Thursday or a Friday afternoon, ask me to polish his boots in readiness to go out dancing or socializing over the weekend. I do not remember if any money changed hands for this work, but once again this was of little consequence to me, as it gave me great satisfaction in polishing the said footwear, and in the fact that my brother appreciated my efforts.

Back to where we started. I wear the old Grosby slippers almost every day. With the wool type lining, they are warm and extremely comfortable to move around in. They are a little worn and discoloured, but just like the cartoon dog said all those years ago, "Grosby shoes, they are great mate". After all the years that these slippers have been around, I just know, like everything we once made, they will continue to serve me well for a little while longer. Not to give advice, but good old shoes and boots that were once made in Australia, and I guess some still are, are still out there just waiting for a new owner to give them their next life.

BOARDERS AND LODGERS HAVE RIGHTS TOO

Rising rents and a lack of available homes have prompted many Western Australians to seek out share houses as a way of keeping a roof over their heads at a price they can afford.

Before taking on a housemate, or becoming one yourself, it's crucial that everyone understands the arrangement they have agreed to, as the law applies differently to boarders and lodgers [QR code] than it does to co-tenants [QR code] or sub-tenants [QR code].

If you pay rent to stay at someone else's house, then you're likely to be considered a lodger. If meals are supplied too, you're probably a boarder. Because neither boarders nor lodgers are technically considered 'tenants', they aren't covered by the Residential Tenancies Act 1987 (which protects cotenants and sub-tenants), but instead have rights under both common law and the Australian Consumer Law (ACL).







Under the ACL, the property must be fit for purpose, meaning it must be safe, habitable and meet your needs as discussed with the landlord at the beginning.

Should a major problem arise with your boarder or lodger arrangement – such as a serious issue (or a series of smaller issues) that would've stopped you moving in – the landlord must fix the issue in a reasonable time.

In rooming or boarding arrangements that continue over a number of years, there may be changes to the services that were initially agreed upon and the landlord must let you know about them as soon as possible. For major changes the landlord must seek your consent to continue with the change, or offer you a new agreement at a lower cost.

The landlord is also not allowed to make false or misleading representations about the property or services, such as claiming there is air-conditioning when there isn't, or agreeing to provide a wide variety of meals when they don't.

If you have a problem with the property or the services provided, contact your landlord directly in the first instance to give them the opportunity to fix the problem. If this doesn't work, we may be able to help negotiate an agreed outcome.

If you are not sure whether you are a boarder, lodger, co-tenant or sub-tenant, contact Consumer Protection at <u>consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au</u> or 1300 30 40 54 to discuss. In some circumstances it may be necessary for a court to make a binding decision about which one you are.

Ford vs Holden. Case IH vs John Deere. Backstreet Boys vs N Sync. All classic rivalries. However, none of these surpass the 2023 rivalry of Wagin vs Narrogin in the UGSFL C Grade competition. It was very fitting for the two standout teams of the competition to finish first and second and face each other on Saturday for a Semi-Final which saw the winner go straight to the grand final.

The sleepy hollow of Kukerin hosted the day's proceedings and put on an absolutely belter of a day. Unseasonably warm temps, minimal breeze and a dry oval met the players, resulting in perfect conditions for a highly skilled game of football.

The game got off to a flying start, with Narrogin slotting one through early, and with a quick reply from Wagin by none other than Shauny Boy Garlett. Shaun has had another sensational season and for the second year running will take home the trophy for the most goals in UGSFL C Grade comp. Whilst this feat is similar to Charlie Curnow's efforts with the Coleman medal, Garlett's approach in front of goals is more reminiscent of Charlie Cameron: an absolute livewire who can kick it around the body with 2cm of room around him. Whilst the individual honour is to be celebrated, Garlett's eyes are fixed firmly on the premiership, and this was shown by his four-quarter effort on Saturday. Garlett claimed three goals and was a key player in many impressive passages of play.

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The first quarter set the tone for the rest of the match, with plenty of hard play and tight contests through the midfield. Wagin rotated their rucks, utilising Jack Holt, Max Slawinski and Blake Simons, who are also all very handy when moved up forward. Slawinski has been one of the most improved over the year, and once again showed confident marking and laid some great tackles. Liam Robinson is another capable ruck option within the Wagin team, but he was kept busy otherwise playing on Max Skerritt who recently represented WA at the National U16 Championships. Robinson played a solid four quarters and was influential in slowing down Narrogin's ball movement forward.

Captain Jamo Davidson and Vice Captain Brodie Hills led by example from the guts of the ground. Tidy clearances and hard ball gets were a prominent feature in both of their games. They worked tirelessly to try and feed the ball into the Wagin forwards. The Narrogin defence were pretty handy with the spoils and made it hard for the Wagin forwards to get clean marks. However, at ground level the team worked hard. Todd Riley was the star of a beautiful passage of play when, in the second quarter, he laid the most magnificent tackle embedding the Narrogin player into the Kukerin Oval subsoil. Riley was then awarded a shot on goal to which he kicked it through cleanly. Charlie Holt is built for the crumbing role and, with his agility of a cat with the neighbours' canary, he manages to see a fair bit of the ball deep in the forward pockets. He kicked one for the game, as did Alfred Finlayson who is sneaking onto the goal scorer's tally with more frequency.

Defensively Wagin worked hard. Cody McIllree once again stood up as one of the

most reliable marks on the ground. Carter English should from here on in be known as the smiling assassin. English's hard approach to the football is a sight to behold and, if you check his face after he's laid a decent tackle, there is always a satisfied smirk like he'd just taken the last lolly that his little brother Hudson had been eyeing off. The English brothers, the Barlow brothers and McIllree ensured that Narrogin had to work hard for every forward 50 entry.

The Wagin team's final quarter was above and beyond their best, as everything seemed to flow that bit easier and they were all focused on the football. However, despite winning the final quarter, they lost the game. The final scoreline read *Narrogin* 9.7.61 *defeat Wagin* 6.7.43.

Wagin now have a second chance to make the grand final when they play Katanning in Katanning on Sunday. Fortunately, the Bulldogs suffered no injuries and an extra game of football should serve them well. **SPORTS NEWS**
