With the two junior Bulldogs teams making their respective Grand Finals, the excitement for the locals was in the first two games of the day. The Wagin crowd claimed their spots early, with some even parking up at 6am to ensure a good vantage point for the games.

The Wagin D Grade team started the day's events but unfortunately suffered a narrow loss against a much taller Katanning side. Dougy Banks was awarded with the Les Grout Medal for the UGSFL D Grade Best and Fairest. Mitch Hills was awarded the Best Wagin Player in the Grand Final. Meanwhile, Will Robinson made a mockery of his first year player yellow shorts, playing tougher football than what was even seen in the League Grand Final.

Following on from witnessing their younger clubmates' defeat, it was the C Grade team's time to do battle with the Narrogin Hawks. The two teams have had some heated contests this year with Narrogin having won two games and Wagin winning one. Both times that Narrogin won they flew out of the blocks early and piled the goals on. It was a concern that this game would go the same way, but the defensive efforts of Deizel and Devon Barlow challenged the Narrogin forwards, who were feeling the pressure and having trouble converting goals. It is an utmost compliment to describe the Barlows as the Bash Brothers and with Cody McIllree alongside, the Wagin defence puts up a very sturdy brickwall.

The Prohibited burning period commences on the 1st of November 2023. Please ensure that your firebreaks are in place by this date and maintained through to the 30th of April 2024.

"Bike Month is a great opportunity for friends, family and the community to come together for some fun and fitness", said Agricultural Region MLC Shelley Payne.

'BITUMEN BANDITS' NAMED IN ORGANISED SCAM OPERATION

Consumer Protection is warning WA home and business owners to avoid dealing with at least eight road construction companies currently travelling

around the state that offer to re-surface bitumen driveways and car parks for seemingly attractive prices, only to leave terrible bitumen work behind, in worse shape than before.

The travelling conmen known as 'bitumen bandits' use sub-standard materials, demand a higher fee than originally quoted and threaten to destroy the work completed if their invoices are not paid.

Commissioner for Consumer Protection Trish Blake describes the operation as an international organised scam with directors often based in the U.K. or Ireland.

"It is the definition of dodgy and a complete scam – it has to stop", Ms Blake said.

"These con artists posing as tradespeople have a blatant disregard for the law and use completely unethical business practices that prey on innocent people, tricking them into a 'good deal' but ultimately charging highly-inflated prices for shoddy work.

"They lie to potential customers, saying they have left-over bitumen from a job nearby so can offer a cheap price but the finished job is left uneven, thin and soft.









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"In one case in Derby, the bitumen washed away with rain the next day but the customer was still invoiced \$33,000 and demands were made for immediate payment."

The bitumen bandits breach numerous consumer laws including coercing customers for payment after poor quality bitumen works are complete. They also approach potential customers uninvited with unsolicited consumer agreements, fail to observe the required 10 business day cooling off period, provide false representation as to the price of services and falsely claim to be affiliated with Main Roads and other reputable businesses.

In one instance, an invoice of \$32,000 was provided to a Broome consumer after work was completed, which was more than four times the agreed quote of \$7,000.

Consumer Protection first issued a public warning in April 2023. It has now received 31 complaints since the 1st of January 2023 about travelling conmen who have targeted consumers and business owners in regional areas including Albany, Australind, Bunbury, Picton, Williams, Narrogin, Wongan Hills, Collie, Boddington, Kalgoorlie, Geraldton, Derby, Carnarvon, Karratha, Broome and several suburbs in the Perth metropolitan area.

The eight bitumen companies – conveniently registered in WA or over east – and the directors that Consumer Protection warns consumers and businesses to avoid, are: Bitumen Road Services Pty Ltd (Director Andrew Watson); Road Tech Oz Pty Ltd (Director Jack Reagan Maskell); Road Tech Construction Oz Pty Ltd (Director Anthony Kenneth Lee); Regional Civils Pty Ltd (Director Jay Brough); Top Coat Civils Pty Ltd (Director Gabriel Thomas O'Malley Mackerness); Rolo Bitumen Pty Ltd (Director Lee Desmond Rowland); Civil Highways Pty Ltd (Director Jonathan Michael Hovvels) and Ground Fix Landscapes Pty Ltd (Director James Lee). Regular workers from the above companies include Anthony Kenneth Lee, Simon Ross, Thomas Dean Whaley and Matthew Nunn.

The cost of bitumen work subject to Consumer Protection complaints ranges from \$2,700 to \$46,000 with the majority of complaints stating dissatisfaction with the quality of work, being invoiced exorbitant prices compared to the original quote and demands for immediate payment including threats to destroy completed work for non-payment.

"These scam con artists will leave you with dodgy work, harass you for payment and quickly move on, making it difficult for customers and authorities to catch up with them", Ms Blake says.

"If you have already had bitumen works done by any of these companies and are unsatisfied, we recommend not paying the invoice and reporting it to Consumer Protection."

Consumer Protection is working closely with authorities across the country including WA Police, Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC), Home Affairs and other Australian Consumer Law regulators to identify action which may be taken against these conmen.

WA consumers are advised to resist approaches and high-pressure sales tactics from the companies or individuals named and to always seek multiple quotes from reputable local tradespeople.



We have received an exchange of sixty-two new items in early September, here are a few that you may like to read or watch in your spare time:

Get Your Act Together by Doris Kozlowski. A junior fiction book recommended for ages 8 to 12. Doris Kozlowski's life is anything but normal and she has ups and downs in primary school. The novel is funny, laced with themes of discovering who you are and sharing it with the world; staying true to yourself is never overrated.

Dinosaur Dads to the Rescue by Lesley Gibbes. A children's picture book which parents and children would enjoy reading together. The dinosaur dads have been left in charge of a batch of three dinosaur eggs, all ready to hatch. Out of the blue, a volcano rumbles.? Will the dinosaur eggs be safe? Can the dinosaur dads rescue the eggs in time?

I Am This Big by Janeen Brian. A children's picture book. A wonderful story that follows a child's growth and development. CLEARER PRICING RULES FOR FUNERALS

There's nothing easy about losing a loved one, but we hope new WA laws will go a long way towards clearing up any confusion about what their final farewell will cost.

Funeral companies must now publicly display their prices upfront to give consumers the chance to compare costs without having to meet with a representative from the business to get this information. Consumers should now receive a full breakdown of prices and know exactly what the total cost of the funeral will be, so there are no surprises later on.

The new regulations in the Funeral Pricing Code of Practice stop sales practices that once made it difficult for consumers to make informed decisions at a very emotional time. In some previous cases, the final cost wasn't known until after the funeral was held, leading family and friends of the deceased to believe they had been overcharged.

Those consumers who decide to pay for their funerals upfront before they are needed should know they are protected by the mandatory Prepaid Funerals Code of Practice [QR code], which was introduced in 2021. The Code requires goods and services to be detailed in the contract, prices to be fixed at the time



of signing, a 30-day cooling off period and payments to prepaid funeral funds to be managed within secure investments under the name of the client until they are required.

It's important to note that prepaid funeral cover is different to funeral insurance, which should be treated with caution given ongoing payments are required for the rest of a consumer's life – meaning they could pay significantly more than the actual payment their family will receive.

Funeral bonds bought through a funeral director, a friendly society or a life insurer are another way of saving for funeral expenses. After paying an initial deposit, regular payments are made over time and the money grows in value with interest. Money invested in this way can only be used for a funeral, meaning it can't be taken out earlier.

Ultimately, we believe the simplest way to pay upfront for a funeral is to save up for it in a term deposit or savings account, separate to your everyday bank account.

DON'T TIP TOE THROUGH THESE TULIPS!



One-leaf Cape Tulip (Moraea flaccida); Two-leaf Cape Tulip (Moraea miniata); Cormils on stem.

You might have recently noticed these pretty looking flowers when walking through the bush, spotted them growing along roadsides or seen them in paddocks, particularly in the Southwest of the state. Members of the Iridaceae (Iris) family, these lovely looking flowers are actually a serious and widespread weed in Western Australia. They are commonly called the One-leaf and Two-leaf Cape Tulip.

As the name suggests, One-leaf Cape Tulip typically has only one leaf per plant. The flower colour ranges between orange and salmon pink with a yellow centre. It reproduces via both seed and annually renewed corms. The seeds and corms sprout in autumn after rain, with up to 60% of corms potentially staying dormant each year.

Two-leaf Cape Tulip has a similar looking flower but can be distinguished by having two to three leaves per plant. It sprouts in autumn and flowers in spring. However, unlike the one-leaf variety, it doesn't seed, but produces cormils on its stems.

Why control: Both varieties of cape tulip are a serious weed of pastures, roadsides, wastelands, and bushland. In pasture, livestock often selectively graze clovers and other more palatable species, which allows cape tulip to flourish. However, if eaten, all parts of cape tulip are toxic to livestock while the plant material exists - whether it is alive, dying, or dead. Spraying with herbicides does not remove its toxicity.

When to control: The optimal time for chemical control of both plants is July to September, when they flower, and the corm is exhausted. After this time the plant material will start to dry out, making any kind of chemical difficult for the plant to absorb.

If you have missed the opportunity to control this year, all is not lost. Take note of where you have seen Cape Tulip so you can be prepared and ready to control it for the next season.

It was her first win since January when she led all the way at Busselton on New Year's Day.

It wouldn't be country racing without a win for Trent Wheeler, and he did just that in race three when he piloted Gota Good Warhol to victory for Hayden Reeves. The consistent fouryear-old brought up his sixth career win at start 55, his fifth this season alone. The \$2.50 was able to lead from barrier two, holding out Sport Sport Sport for the entire journey with the two tussling it out to the line with just a head margin between them at the finish.
