A three-month consultation opened on the 17<sup>th</sup> of August 2023, encouraging feedback on a discussion paper on the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) website [QR code].

Responses will inform the development of:

- draft regulations;
- specifications and functionality in the Centralised Registration System;
- resources needed by local government to implement and enforce legislative requirements.

DLGSC is also seeking feedback from community members, animal rehoming services, vet practices and other stakeholders.

You are encouraged to provide your feedback by completing the online survey, which can be accessed with the above QR code.

The consultation closes on the 17<sup>th</sup> of November 2023.

#### **RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD**

The Restricted burning period has commenced with a permit required to burn from the 1<sup>st</sup> of October until the 31<sup>st</sup> of October 2023.

During this period permits to burn can be obtained from your Local Volunteer Bush Fire Control Officer if you are outside the town boundary, or at the Shire of Wagin Office if your property is located within the Wagin town boundary.

The Prohibited burning period commences on the 1<sup>st</sup> of November 2023. Please ensure that your firebreaks are in place by this date and maintained through to the 30<sup>th</sup> of April 2024.

#### **RECYCLING YOUR REFUNDABLE CONTAINERS IS GETTING EASIER**

#### Norm Chilcott, All Good Refund Depot

You can fight the fill from the palm of your hand with the Containers for Change WA app available for download from the Apple Store or Google play.

This handy tool will help you locate your closest refund point or bag drop, it has a handy scanner that links with you mobile to tell you what's in and what's out and help you get your refund sooner when you can set up your own member number through it.

Using the app, very soon you will be able to book a personal pick-up for those times when you are unable to get in to drop off your items. Watch this space so we can tell you more about this as it happens. As I understand it, from your app you will be able to put in your address, see when the next pick up is happening in your region and book a pick-up slot. How easy is that?

To find out more about the app or to download it, just follow this QR code.

All Good Refund Depot has now processed just under 5,000,000 items through its Wagin processing facility. These items have not only come from Wagin, but all of the surrounding towns where we have bag drops and pick up points. We could not do any of it without you.



That number is huge. Let it sink in. That is 5,000,000 items or \$500,000 back into the community through private collectors, businesses and non-profit organisations.

Our team really appreciates what you are doing for the environment by sending your refundable containers in for processing, but there are a couple of house keeping things I need to remind you about.

Please remember to remove your lids. Even though some containers have text that reads, "Crush plastic bottle and replace lids", please don't. We do want your lids, but it helps us a lot if they are separated from the container.

Fun fact of the day: Did you know that Western Australia is the only State or Territory in Australia that recycles the container and the lid? Way to go, WA.

All Good Refund Depot now has pick-ups from Lake Grace, Kukerin, Dumbleyung, Nyabing, Pingrup, Hyden, Kulin, Harrismith, Wickepin, Tincurrin, Highbury, Beaufort River, Arthur River and Duranillin.

### AUS POST DELIVERS GRANTS TO WA MENTAL HEALTH PROJECTS

#### Australia Post

Australia Post's 2023 Community Grants program will provide funding to 72 not-for-profit community groups across the country whose projects support mental health and greater connection in their communities.

In Western Australia, the grant has been awarded to 11 groups across varied categories including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, LGBTIQ+, the Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD), people with a disability or care commitments, and older Australians (65+).

The Waves of Wellness Foundation is one of the grant recipients and will deliver two eightweek surf therapy programs in Western Australia. The programs will use surfing and the ocean as a conduit to explore, stimulate and facilitate positive mental health outcomes whilst also connecting like-minded individuals.

GLBTI Rights in Ageing (GRAI) is another grant recipient that will use the funds to support Ageing Together with Pride a series of mental health-focused activities for LGBTI people aged 50 and older. The project will address the increased risk of loneliness and isolation for older LGBTI people and provide a structure for peer support, to improve wellbeing and connectedness.

Armadale Community Family Centre will also receive a grant for Drum boost wellbeing – Drum boost fun!, an eight-week psychoeducational program for women impacted by domestic violence to learn drumming and improve their mental wellbeing. The program will help participants to reduce stress, strengthen resilience and connect them to local resources.

The 11 recipients of the grants in Western Australia will each receive funding of up to \$10,000, demonstrating Australia Post's commitment to addressing the varied challenges and needs of all Australian communities.

Australia Post Executive General Manager, Community, Sustainability and Stakeholder Engagement, Tanny Mangos, said it was pleasing to see such a wide range of categories

represented in this year's grant recipients, demonstrating the need for community support across a range of groups and regions.

"Australia Post's Community Grants program has been put in place to empower organisations to continue their impactful work and make a positive difference in the lives of countless Australians. This year, we are supporting community groups fostering stronger mental health and well-being within their local communities.

"Mental health support groups and programs have been identified as an area that requires ongoing support and commitment, from groups that keep elderly Australians connected, to

Since 2013, more than 800 projects have been awarded a Community Grant from Australia Post. 





#### THE WAY OF THE SYSTEM

As per my usual titles for my stories, perhaps a little unusual. I never seem to run out of ideas for The Real Australian stories that I enjoy writing for our paper, but having said this, I like to think of a thread that I can base a story upon. I was going through some old documents that I have had stored for years. I was looking for something completely unrelated to this story, but found an old envelope with a letter inside that was addressed to my mother at my old home address in Newcastle NSW from many years ago. At first, I did not have any idea how I would have ended up with the letter, or indeed who would have sent this letter to my mother. Upon inspection, the letter had been addressed in a very orderly manner. My printing these days is, in my opinion, not brilliant, due to possibly the fact that for many years I had worked in the retail side of the automotive industry. You wrote information down in a rapid shorthand fashion. I guess I was the only one who would be able to decipher my scrawled ledger. Even though the writing on the said envelope was done in an orderly manner, it appeared at first glance to have maybe been written by a much younger person who was perhaps just learning how to write. I was correct in my assumption.

I opened the letter and the memory came flooding back to me. I had written it myself, in my estimation some fifty eight years ago. I will touch on the education system briefly in this story, of how I remember it in my formulative years. There are so many stories within stories; maybe in another story in the future I will expand on that further. This story relates to our Australia Post System. I understand the way of things, all bill documentation, bill paying etc., is all going the way of electronic transactions via the internet. I guess it is a throwback to the letter I wrote to my mother all those years ago. Even though my mother used to read me stories from nursery rhyme books etc., my knowledge of reading and writing was minimal. Even though I spent a lot of time with my mother before I started school, in my opinion it was the responsibility of the education system to bring you up to speed on how to read, and to master the art of writing. Having said this, it was not only your duty as an Australian, but also your responsibility to become educated in the ways of our schooling system. That, as I may have mentioned in previous stories, was a magnificent opportunity presented to myself. I never lose confidence in Australia. Our education system in Australia, in my opinion, rates as one of the best there is.

In the previously mentioned letter, I have been fortunate in the way of being gifted with a very good memory. I remember going to school on the day I wrote the letter. My schoolteacher had given everybody in my class notice during the previous days to bring an envelope and a couple of pennies from home. Maybe the equivalent of one or two cents in today's money. Everything was transparent, the teacher explained to the class. Explain to your parents that you will be writing a letter to them. Added to the explanation, from memory, was to be able to not only show your parents how you were progressing with your writing skills, but to gain an understanding of how our postal system in Australia works. Plus, of course, that you could string a few sentences together in the way of an appropriate letter. I guess in those days maybe everyone had envelopes at home. That was many years

ago. I did arrive at school on the day I wrote the said letter with an envelope, and had enough funds to cover the postage.

In short, everyone in my school class wrote a letter, we sealed the envelope, our teacher at the head of our class instructed all of the students to follow her down to the post office, we purchased a stamp from the person in the post office, put it on the envelope and placed it in the outwards mailing section outside the post office. The next day I arrived home from school and the letter had arrived. My mother knew the situation with the letter. We opened it together. My mother and I were both happy in the fact that not only was I starting to become a little older, but that simple letter was the precursor for one of my biggest learning curves. My mother kept the letter all those years. After my mother had passed away, my older brothers sent me a package of photos etc., that may have been of significance to me. Amongst them was my first letter I had ever wrote to my mother.

In closing, still to this today, I really enjoy going to the mailbox and receiving mail. We are fortunate in our town. We have a post office, the staff are good people to deal with, excellent at what they do. Instead of mail being delivered on bicycles when I was growing up, our post lady deliverers our mail, as you would be well aware, on a small motorcycle. Also, as a matter of closing, I still post parcels around Australia, and I also, on the odd occasion, send letters to people. I never take anything for granted in our great country. I guess I could also go the way of the internet and do a lot more transactions via this method, but as mentioned, bills or not, I really enjoy the traditional method of going to the mailbox and receiving mail and going to our post office and sending mail. So if you read this story I have written, maybe the next time if you have need to go into our local post office, maybe thank our post office staff for the service they do for us all, and maybe think just how fortunate we are to live in such, in my opinion, a most fortunate country. I hope everybody enjoyed this story. Go well and be safe.

#### TOUGH NEW PENALTIES FOR UNFAIR T&CS

Many consumers don't have the time or patience to read long lists of terms and conditions that often accompany the products and services they buy, but at least they can take comfort knowing they will soon be better-protected if any of those contracts are not fair.

That's because the Australian Consumer Law has recently been amended to introduce penalties for businesses that present contracts containing unfair terms.

Standard form contracts provide a cost-effective way for businesses like telcos, gyms, car rental companies and travel agencies to deal with significant volumes of customers. However, because these contracts are largely imposed on a 'take it or leave it' basis, consumers often have little to no chance to negotiate.

An example of an unfair contact term in the travel industry may be a clause that requires the consumer to pay excessive compensation or cancellation charges regardless of whether the service is cancelled by the consumer or travel operator. Businesses should consider limiting any fees to the reasonable costs associated with providing the service for that particular consumer, otherwise they may be seen as penalties, which may be considered unfair contract terms.

Previously, a court could only make a final decision on whether a contract term was unfair and therefore void, but could not impose penalties on businesses that included them in standard form contracts.

All that changed in November 2022, when legal changes to introduce penalties and other changes relating to unfair contract terms passed Federal Parliament. Businesses now only have a few months left to review and update their standard form contracts to ensure they are fair and balanced before the penalties will apply.

From the 9<sup>th</sup> of November 2023, the maximum penalties for businesses will be the greatest of \$50 million; three times the benefit obtained from the conduct; or, if that can't be determined, 30 per cent of the relevant turnover during the breach period. The maximum penalty for individuals will be \$2.5 million.

To identify an unfair contract term, consumers can consider whether it causes a significant imbalance between their rights and obligations versus those of the business. Also think about whether the term is reasonably necessary to protect the legitimate interests of the business, how transparent it is, and whether the term would cause you detriment (financial or otherwise) if the business was to enforce it.

#### **BE BREAST AWARE THIS OCTOBER!**

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month so it's an important time to shine a light on the impact that breast cancer has on many Australians. It's also important for people to get to know common breast cancer symptoms.

Women from regional Western Australia (WA) are known to delay going to a medical clinic when they were experiencing symptoms, with many experiencing self-doubt about the existence of the symptom. In 2019, 1,899 women in WA were diagnosed with breast cancer, and 259 women lost their lives to it.

If you're unsure about a possible symptom, you should make an appointment to discuss the change with your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker as soon as possible. This is particularly important if it's been more than four weeks since you first noticed the change. Cancer treatments have improved in recent years, and it is much easier to successfully treat breast cancer if it is found early. The more it spreads, the harder it is to treat. So, we must Find Cancer Early.



Everyone's breasts are different. It is important that you get to know what your breasts look and feel like, so you know what is normal for you. There is no right or wrong way to check your breasts.

#### Common symptoms of breast cancer include:

- A lump or hard area in your breast or underarm, especially if it is only on one side;
- A change in the size, shape or feel of your breast;
- Change in the look of your breast, including redness, rash, or your skin looks like the skin of an orange, or is wrinkling in small folds;
- Changes to the nipple, like it's pulled inwards, leaking, itchy or has a sore that won't heal;
- Breast pain or discomfort, especially if it is only on one side;
- An area of the breast that feels different to the rest.

You can give yourself the best chance to Find Cancer Early by going to see a doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker straight away if you have any of the symptoms above. The benefits to Finding Cancer Early is that treatment is easier, and you can be around longer to do the things you love doing with the people you love.


