The WA Rural Ambassador Award is part of the Rural Leaders Program, coordinated by the Royal Agricultural Society of WA to provide opportunities for those living and working in regional WA and to support young people interested in pursuing a career in agriculture.

Chloe was one of five entrants for this prestigious award. The other four entrants were represented from Swan View and Districts Ag. and Arts Society, Chapman Valley Ag. Society, Brunswick Ag. Society, and Toodyay Ag. Society.

The winner, Lauren Patane, represented the Brunswick Ag. Society. Five very talented and inspiring young women, each worthy of the coveted blue sash.

Chloe's earliest memories of her local Agricultural Show would be of her grandfather, Geoffrey Blight, known for his contributions to the local and wider agricultural community. He was known

Chloe's contribution as a Rural Ambassador has seen her involved in programs to develop skills, including the CBH Grass Roots Leadership program and the National Mentoring Program with the Australian Rural Leadership Foundation.



#### RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD

The Restricted burning period has commenced with a permit required to burn from the 1<sup>st</sup> of October until the 31<sup>st</sup> of October 2023.

During this period, permits to burn can be obtained from your Local Volunteer Bush Fire Control Officer if you are outside the town boundary, or at the Shire of Wagin Office if your property is located within the Wagin town boundary.

The Prohibited burning period commences on the 1st of November 2023. Please ensure that your firebreaks are in place by this date and maintained through to the 30th of April 2024.





#### **RED GRANTS SUPPORT INDUSTRY & JOBS IN GREAT SOUTHERN**

Four Great Southern projects will share in \$470,000 funding under Round 6 of the Cook Government's Regional Economic Development (RED) Grants program.

The RED Grants program is investing \$50.85 million over nine years toward locally driven projects to stimulate economic growth and build resilience in the regions.

"Round six of our RED Grants program will support local businesses focused on job creation and industry expansion in the Great Southern", said Regional Development Hon Minister Don Punch MLA.

"Healthcare, childcare and manufacturing are key priorities for development in the Great Southern – and together the successful recipients will help give these sectors a boost.

"These initiatives reflect the Cook Government's commitment to driving diversified employment opportunities and supporting the people behind local businesses in our regions."

Successful projects in round six will diversify and support expansion of four businesses in the Great Southern, including Gracefield Enterprises who has received \$110,000 to upgrade the Katanning Veterinary Clinic into the only purpose-built 24/7 Veterinary Hospital in the Upper Great Southern region.

The RED Grant will be used to purchase specialised medical equipment, high quality veterinary animal housing and emergency and critical care equipment.

The Ocean Beach Health Group will use its \$150,000 grant for the development of a five room, multi-disciplinary, allied health centre in Denmark, to provide a shared care model of health care.

The project will create sustainable jobs and expand the range of allied health options not currently available in the area.

Albany-based Village Childcare Services has been awarded \$140,000 to establish a long day care centre in Albany and expand existing outside school hours and vacation care.

The funding will provide an additional 68 childcare placements from 0 to 12 years.

A \$70,000 grant will fund the expansion of Cannabis Botanical Distillery's manufacturing facility in Denmark, increasing their manufacturing capacity from 3,500 to 35,000 litres per annum.








#### **BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS**

Origins of Halloween: the tradition originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. This information was provided by history.com. Over time, Halloween evolved into a day of activities like trick-or-treating, donning costumes and eating treats. Some people even visit haunting attractions. Another way to celebrate Halloween is to watch scary movies or read scary books. Halloween is on the 31st of October every year. We have a few scary items in our library if you are brave enough to read or watch.

- How to Sell a Haunted House by Grady Hendrix. This is a horror fiction book. A woman returns home to bury her parents, only to find a spectacularly terrifying blast from the past waiting for her. The woman does not want to deal with the family home. Her mother had a lifelong obsession with puppets and dolls. Some houses do not want to be sold.
- Dead Ever After by Charlaine Harris. This is a large print book which contains horror, crime, and fantasy. When a shocking murder rocks the town of Bon Temps, Louisiana, psychic cocktail waitress Sookie Stackhouse learns that she has more than one enemy waiting to get vengeance for the past. Who will be dead ever after?
- The Stand by Stephen King. This is a crossover of epic fantasy, horror and dystopia. This is an adult fiction book. First came the days of the plague. Then came the dreams, dark dreams, that warned of the coming of the dark man. The warlord of the charnel house and prince of evil. His empire grows in the west and the apocalypse looms.
- Room on the Broom by Julia Donaldson. This is a children's board picture book. It is a good book to read at Halloween even though it's not really a Halloween book. It teaches a great lesson about helping each other in all kinds of situations.
- Pumpkin Party! By Maudie Powell-Tuck. This is a children's board picture book. Pumpkins ready. Pumpkins set. Bob for apples, don't get wet! This happy rhyme is a perfect Halloween treat.

#### **GIRLS AND STEM CAREERS**

The West Arthur CRC recently saw a group of about 25 young ladies and their mums attend the Girls and Stem Careers. The idea of the event was to encourage young people to start thinking about their careers, especially in the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) industry. To start the night off everyone was encouraged to create a mocktail to enjoy and some lovely finger foods before the speakers took to the stage.





The speakers on the night talked about a range of STEM careers, from agriculture and soil science to medical fields such as Physiotherapy, nursing and research, then from accounting to engineering such as mechanics. One point of these careers is that not everyone has to go to University to get into these areas, many of our speakers suggested other ways that STEM careers can be reached. Be it from attending University full time or

remotely through distance learning, going to TAFE completing courses or through an apprenticeship/traineeship. There was encouragement to go for their desired career and to not be afraid of breaking stereotypes like the male dominated careers. A great night was had by all and the West Arthur CRC would like to acknowledge Inspiring WA STEM, the Department of Jobs, Tourism, Science and Innovation and SciTech for the grant to make this event possible.





#### DON'T BE TAKEN FOR A RIDE BUYING A USED CAR

There's a lot to consider when buying a used car, such as your budget and what type of vehicle will suit your needs, but of utmost importance is ensuring you don't drive away with a lemon.

We recently issued a warning [QR code] against licensed car dealer Ventura Autos, after receiving 136 complaints about the selling of unroadworthy vehicles, in breach of the Australian Consumer Law.

During their compliance inspections of the Welshpool business, our automotive officers issued 43 defect notices on vehicles being sold for issues such as non-compliant tyres, windscreens, oil leaks and seatbelts.

When purchasing a vehicle, consumers rightly expect they will receive a car without any significant problems. That's why we have released an easy-to-follow used car buyer's checklist in partnership with the Motor Trade Association of WA.

The checklist empowers buyers to know what to look out for when shopping around for a second-hand car and gives them the best chance at driving away with a safe and reliable vehicle.

At the top of the checklist is a \$2 Personal Property Securities Register (or PPSR) check at <a href="mailto:ppsr.gov.au">ppsr.gov.au</a> using the VIN number found in the owner's manual to see if the car is free from debt, stolen or written-off. There's also advice to have the vehicle checked by an independent mechanic and inspect its logbook for signs of regular servicing, any ongoing repairs and odometer readings.

In WA, 70 per cent of used car buyers buy via private sale, but these purchases often don't have the same protections as those vehicles bought from a dealer, which may offer some warranty protection depending on the age and mileage of the vehicle.

Private sales can also be a target for scammers, who offer non-existent cars for sale on online marketplaces, websites and social media platforms. In the past three years, Consumer Protection has heard from 259 consumers who were scammed while trying to buy a car online, including 88 who lost over \$660,000.

This is why it's vital for buyers to be vigilant when shopping online and not hand over their cash before seeing the vehicle in-person and doing a series of checks.



# **Backyard Buddies**

Your monthly guide to pests, weeds and diseases

#### ANTS IN YOUR PLANTS, AND PAVERS?

Want to know what your problem ants are and how to control them? You've come to the right place. There are thousands of ant species in Australia, and most are difficult to identify without a microscope and specialist knowledge. There are very effective baits for some species, while others require control using sprays. Other species rarely need any control and can be left alone. Unless you know the species of ant, control can be guesswork, which can waste your time and money, and involve the unnecessary use of pesticides.

By submitting samples for identification, you can learn about the species of ants at your property and how to control them, plus you'll contribute to ant surveillance in WA. Detections in recent years of exotic and problematic species, such as the African black sugar ant and red imported fire ant, is a testament to the ability of ants to arrive in WA via freight and cargo. Their rapid detection provides the best chance of eradication and prevents the economic, social and environmental impacts caused by these ants.

For ant identification services, we request that only **dead** specimens are submitted. This will prevent any unintended spread of the ants, whilst keeping the postie happy!

#### Sampling instructions

- Brush ants into a sealed container, Ziplock bag or collect ants using the sticky side of transparent tape and fix this gently to a piece of paper.
- Place sample in the freezer for 1-2 hours to kill any live ants.
- Label samples with the collection location e.g., backyard, kitchen, bathroom, driveway
  etc., and include a note with your name, address, contact number and email address.
- Deliver or post to: Pest and Disease Information Service (PaDIS), Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, 3 Baron-Hay Court, South Perth WA 6151.

Any suspected exotic ant species should be reported for biosecurity screening to the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.

#### **GETTING A GOOD NIGHT'S SLEEP**



There are times in business when it's all go, whether it's on the farm during seeding and harvest or meeting deadlines at work. It may mean working longer than normal hours and possibly becoming sleep deprived. A lack of sleep not only reduces our ability to perform work effectively, it also reduces our ability to work safely. Some have regarded sleep as a useless waste of time with no

purpose – *not true*. Science and medicine are discovering more and more about the role of sleep and its influence on our wellbeing and health.

How much sleep do we really need?

- Infants and toddlers: 9 to 10 hours at night plus day naps;
- School age including teenager: do best with 9 to 11 hours at night;
- Most adults: 7 to 8 hours a night;
- Older adults need the same as younger adults but sleep lighter and for shorter periods.

Some people just need fewer hours of six or less a night without ill effects. The need for less or even more sleep can run in families (suggesting a genetic basis but it is incredibly rare).

What are the effects of lack of sleep? While we're sleeping, our body is busy tending to our physical and mental health and getting us ready for another day. Lack of sleep can lead to:

- Drowsiness and irritability during the day;
- Poor concentration hindering memory and our ability to pay attention;
- Poor physical coordination increasing the risk of accidents;
- High blood pressure which is one of the main risk factors for heart disease;
- Depression.

Regularly sleeping under 5 hours is associated with poor physical/mental health and wellbeing.

Sleep may be more difficult to come by as we age, and this can be traced to treatable health issues that cause interrupted sleep. Some factors that could cause sleep difficulties:

- Sleep disorders like sleep-apnoea, restless leg/arm syndrome, leg cramps;
- Pain from conditions like arthritis, heartburn, back pain, headaches;
- A frequent need to urinate;
- Illness: depression, coughing, shortness of breath;
- Medications.

Some helpful tips for getting a good night's sleep are:

- Go to bed and get up at the same time each day, this synchronizes our body clock;
- Aim for daily exercise before evenings;
- Relax before bed i.e., warm shower, reading and avoid caffeine, nicotine and alcohol;
- Establish your pre-sleep routine (usually 3 things);
- Use bedroom/bed only for sleeping or intimacy, not as a lounge room for watching TV.

Generally, if we can't sleep, we shouldn't lie in bed. Leave the bedroom and do a quiet activity that doesn't stimulate us. To help maintain a healthy lifestyle we all need to contemplate what is an adequate amount of sleep for us personally and visit our GP for treatment if we are amassing a huge sleep debt.
