Western Australian businesses have been celebrated for their unwavering support of emergency services volunteers over the past year at the 2023 Volunteer Employer Recognition Awards (VERA).

Now in its 15th year, VERA recognises the critical role employers play in supporting employees so they can fulfil their duties as first responders.

VERA also acknowledges the self-employed volunteers who often close their doors or turn down jobs at a moment's notice to attend incidents.

Today, 57 businesses across Western Australia were announced as VERA recipients, joining a distinguished group of nearly 1,000 businesses which have been recognised since the awards began in 2009.

The diverse group of recipients – ranging from small restaurants to large resource companies – includes 14 self-employed volunteers. CRISP Wireless and Roger Northey in Narrogin were both honoured, as was AFGRI Equipment and CBH Group in Lake Grace. DM Spencer and LA Lucas, and Wagin Mechanical Repairs in Wagin were also honoured.

Shire of Wagin offered a huge congratulations to the Wagin businesses and thanked them for putting their community ahead of their business.

"Great recognition for a vital service to the community! We thank you for going above and beyond the call of duty", commended Radio Great Southern manager Norm Chilcott.

SHOUT OUT FROM THE OFFICE

Hello from the manager's desk. It's November already! At this rate it will be Christmas before we know it.

It's important to look after yourself during the business of preparing for the summer holidays and festivities. Below is an excerpt from an article I was reading about aging well. It's the brain-body connection. (Made me think about Kermit the Frog's version of The Rainbow Connection.) Now, while you hum that tune, read on...

THE BRAIN-BODY CONNECTION

National Institute of Aging, USA (excerpt)

There is growing scientific evidence of the brain-body connection. Not only can changes in our brain affect our thinking, but also changes in our physical health may affect our brains.

For example, a National Institute on Aging study of almost 3,000 older adults showed that healthy lifestyle factors – physical activity, not smoking, not drinking heavily, following the Mediterranean-style diet, and engaging in mentally stimulating activities – can have important benefits. People who engaged in four or five of these behaviours had a 60% lower risk of developing Alzheimer's compared to those who only followed one or none. People who followed two or three of the activities had a 37% lower risk.

In another study, older adults with higher levels of physical activity showed slower rates of cognitive decline than peers who were less active. Another example of how physical health can affect brain health has to do with the heart. Observational studies have found that high blood pressure in middle age, along with other cerebrovascular risk factors, such as diabetes and smoking, increase the risk of developing dementia.

Results from observational studies such as these can't prove cause and effect, but they point to how a combination of modifiable behaviours may affect the brain as people age, and identify promising avenues to be tested further.

Talk with your doctor if you're concerned about changes in your thinking and memory.





SUPPORTING A LEVEL PLAYING FIELD

Have you ever walked away from a business transaction and felt it was unfair or you questioned how you were treated?

Whether you are a consumer or owner of a small business, you may have felt that it didn't feel like a level playing field. These types of business behaviours are referred to as unfair trading practices and the Australian Government is looking into how these behaviours might be causing harm and what could be done about it.

Currently, the Australian Consumer Law (ACL) bans several specific unfair business practices, such as false representations or unfair contract terms, but there is no ban on unfair trading practices in general, which can also impact consumers.

Examples of unfair practices can include using confusing information when trying to unsubscribe from a streaming service, or even a red button for 'yes' and a green button for 'no'. Offering a "free prize" in exchange for collecting and using your personal data is another common example.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) recognises that many consumers and small businesses have limited bargaining power in dealing and competing with large businesses, making them more susceptible to unfair trading practices, that can also discourage or inhibit small businesses from competing in markets.

The Australian Government is looking at international jurisdictions, seeking recommendations from all consumer agencies to help shape Australia's competition and consumer laws around unfair trading practices, and seeking input from the community to make sure that consumers and small businesses aren't disadvantaged by large business.

The experiences and knowledge of consumers, consumer groups and small businesses are being sought on the proposed reforms to help level the playing field to better protect consumers and small businesses, and to guide and promote better business conduct, generally.

Consultation is now open and submissions are due to the Department of Treasury by Wednesday the 29th of November 2023. Take a few minutes to share your experiences and how you feel these actions are causing harm by visiting this QR code, so we can all work together to ensure a more level, and therefore fairer, playing field for all.

BLOCK YOUR DRIVER'S LICENCE TO LOCK-OUT IDENTITY THIEVES

Money is not the only thing scammers are looking to steal these days – your personal identification can be just as valuable to them.

As part of their ruse, scammers posing as legitimate organisations or government service providers often pretend to need copies of your driver's licence and passport to verify your identity, when their actual aim is to steal it.

Having your identity stolen can cause devastating and long-lasting impacts, from finding unauthorised purchases on your credit card, through to having your name used to open bank accounts, take out loans and even to scam other people.

Just recently, Consumer Protection issued a warning [QR code] about a fake WA Seniors Card website that was targeting seniors for both their money and multiple forms of identification. In reality, the WA Seniors Card is free of charge and applicants are never requested to pay a fee or disclose personal identification in exchange for membership.

Aside from sending scammers your personal information, the other way they can get their hands on it is through data breaches that occur when cybercriminals hack into an organisation's system and leak their customers' details onto the dark web.

To help protect all WA consumers from identity theft, the Department of Transport has made it possible to put a block on your driver's licence to stop it being used to verify your identity online.

Putting a block on your driver's licence or learner's permit means if a scammer tries to use these documents for identity verification through the Australian Government's Document Verification Service (DVS) [QR code], it will be declined.

You can add and remove a driver's licence block anytime using DoTDirect [QR code] by navigating to the 'Protect your identity' section on the 'Driver's licence' page. Your authority to drive is not affected by having a block on your driver's licence.

To learn more about what to do when your driver's licence has been compromised, including how to block it or apply for a new licence number, use this QR code.

If you are caught up in a data breach, or have handed over your personal identification to scammers, your first step should be to contact IDCARE (<u>idcare.org</u>), a national identity and cyber support service on 1800 595 160.

GETTING INTO THE DRIVER'S SEAT – IT'S OUR HEALTH

INITIATIVE

Empowering men to take responsibility for their wellbeing and health, that's our core focus here at The Regional Men's Health Initiative. We do this in light of the adverse statistics that represent men's health in general and the notion that for a large proportion of men developing their health knowledge is not seen as a priority. This fits with men having a more functional view of their health i.e., not seeking help until we are virtually physically impaired by the problem. We often challenge men on these points but what does it really mean as a bloke to take responsibility for his own wellbeing and health?

As blokes we take responsibility and make a lot of informed decisions throughout our lives, on a variety of things such as family, work and social issues. Why then should decisions about our wellbeing and health be any different?

Too many blokes are running into trouble because we keep avoiding and putting off looking after our wellbeing and health. Just being a passive participant is not good enough, we need to be the one in the driver's seat in all areas of our health, be it physical, mental or social/spiritual.

Taking responsibility for our wellbeing and health means becoming an active and informed healthcare consumer. It means scheduling regular service visits with our doctor and being aware of issues that affect us at certain stages of our lives, such as the potential for prostate problems as we get older. We also need to consider issues that could be common in our



families (hereditary) and discuss these with the doctor. It's a bit of a generalisation but how many of us guys rely on our wives or partners for our health when it comes to our diet i.e., what food is in the house and what we eat for dinner?

Remember that it's not our wife's, mate's or doctor's wellbeing and health, it's ours. Good wellbeing and health can only happen if and when we as blokes take responsibility!

While taking charge is important, it doesn't mean we have to go it alone, we all need help sometimes. From a community educator and support worker perspective, this often means our role involves walking beside someone, helping to establish relevant pathways of support. It could also be simply listening to and validating people's issues and accompanying emotions. We see it as walking beside the ute with the window down but not hopping in, it's your ride, you are the one in the driver's seat!

Our key message... before it at all gets too much... Talk to a Mate®!! requires us to take some responsibility in that it's important we identify who our mates are so that when the shit hits the fan (and it does happen) we have a plan in place to address things.

NOVEMBER IS LUNG CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

Did you know?

Lung cancer is the third most common cancer affecting both women and men in Western Australia.

In 2019, 693 Western Australian men and 564 Western Australian women were diagnosed with lung cancer.

Common symptoms of lung cancer include:

Coughing or spitting up blood (once or more)

Or, for more than four weeks:

- A new cough or change to your usual cough
- A lot of chest infections
- Finding it hard to breathe
- Losing weight without trying
- Not feeling hungry
- Pain in your chest and/or shoulder
- Feeling tired or lacking energy
- Changes to your voice, such as hoarseness or croaky voice

If you have coughed up blood, even if it was just once, it's important to tell your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker straight away.

If you have had any of the other symptoms for more than four weeks, tell your doctor, clinic nurse or health worker. It doesn't mean you've got lung cancer – often these symptoms turn out to be something less serious. But it's important to tell your health professional and get checked out to be safe.

If it is lung cancer, the earlier it's found, the earlier it can be treated.
