

CHRISTMAS HOURS

The Shire office and the Wagin Library & Gallery will be closed from Friday the 22^{nd} of December to Tuesday the 2^{nd} of January.

REMEMBRANCE OPPORTUNITY

The Shire have recently created an opportunity for members of the community to place an item around the townsite which they can dedicate to the memory of a loved one.

The options on what that might look like are: planting a tree, installing a park bench, installation of Metal Art, purchasing a paving brick or the installation of a plaque. The specifics of these options are explained in our shire policy which is available on the website or at the shire office. To provide an example, you would purchase a paving brick, advise the wording for the paving brick and once we have sufficient, we would install the paving bricks in a selected footpath around the townsite. Initially this will be the footpath between the new Wagin Library and Gallery location and the Wagin Townhall, and depending on popularity, other places will be selected.

ROADWORKS

Stage 1 of Dongolocking stabilising and bituminising has been completed. Stage 2 will commence after harvesting, in early 2024.

We have received the new Roller and it will be put to good use in the roads program.











'MONET IN PARIS' EXTRAVAGANZA

Colour, colour and more colour was the order of the day as members of the Wagin Camera Club descended on La Grand Palais, Crown Perth at Burswood for an amazing experience on their last outing for the year.

Following on from the successful Van Gogh Alive exhibition in Perth during 2022, Monet in Paris – The French Impressionists Alive includes 19th century French masters such as Claude Monet, Georges Seurat, Pierre-Augusta Renoir, Camille Pissarro, Paul Cézanne, Van Gogh and Mary Cassatt.

On arrival members immediately felt transported to the beautiful French countryside of Giverny. After entering the huge marquee and walking through garden beds with mirror reflecting images, down an arched tunnel covered in climbers and past the lily ponds, they finally arrived at the main gallery, especially built to house the presentation.

A sight to behold awaited. The display of light, colour and music brought the masterpieces to life as they were projected onto many towering sevenmetre-high walls with ever changing 360 degree views, through state-of-the-art multi-sensory technology.

Even the floor formed part of the artwork, featuring subtle visual movements of trickling brooks to butterflies, giving the viewer a feeling of being part of the artwork as they meandered through the exhibition.

To top the day off, members gathered on a replica of the famous Monet Bridge over a pond of water lilies to have a group photograph.

Secret Garden Cafe in South Perth was the venue for a late lunch and presentations of the club's annual awards, with 14 members and two guests, to complete the day trip.



The Within Your Wallet Program is back for the summer holidays and term 1 2024! Within Your Wallet is a diversionary program that aims to reduce risk and increase safety by improving protective factors for young people by increasing awareness of online and place-based support services and access to sporting, art and cultural diversionary activities over a 6-month period.

Young people between the ages of 10-18 years who live in the Southern Wheatbelt (Narrogin, Wagin, Boddington, Williams, Wickepin, Pingelly, Brookton) are eligible to have access to a Within Your Wallet - Wallet Card.

At this meeting the final distribution for 2023 of funds raised for the community was made. 

CHRISTMAS BACK THEN

Glenys Ball

Christmas back in the 1950s was a very different experience to the Christmas of today. The commercialisation of the event had not occurred. Social media hadn't been thought of with mobile phones and black and white television still to come, leaving us with only our imagination. No advertisements bombarding us with buy this and buy that and telling us that if we didn't get the best toy for Christmas we were hard done by.

I had a younger sister and a brother and we grew up with a farming background in the 1950s. We come from a generation in which a toy came as a gift at Christmas time and not any other day of the week.

Christmas was the occasion that as kids we hung out for all year. It was usually spent with Mum's family as she had grown up with a mother and a sister as her father had died when she was nine.

One Christmas our family, including my grandmother, piled into the Maple Leaf truck and went all the way to Boddington from Badgebup to spend Christmas with Aunty Peggy and Uncle Peter and my cousins John and Allan. It was Uncle Peter's first posting as a constable and it was the first time Boddington had been appointed a police station.

During the Christmas we visited, there was a prisoner in the cell for a minor offence. Probably for misbehaving the night before or drinking in Boddington's main street. But he wasn't ignored. Aunty Peggy made him a special plate of Christmas food, walked across to the jail in the next paddock alongside the house and gave him the food as well as a cool drink.

That year I received my first bike. It was a second-hand bike and had been done up by Uncle Peter or that was what I was told. It may have been restored by Mum and Dad and hidden on the back of the truck for the trip, however, for 65 years Uncle Peter has always been given the credit.

It was the last present to be handed out from under the tree and I was sitting on the couch believing that I had been forgotten. I must have looked pretty miserable and only at the last minute did I see the very obvious bike and was ecstatic. I spent the rest of the day practising. With Dad and/or Uncle Peter running alongside, by the end of the visit I could cycle without falling off. No helmet of course.

It was the same year that Dad received a border collie pup that Uncle Peter had rescued from a bush camp, where he had been called to sort out a fight a few days before Christmas. We named the pup Benny and he lived a long and happy life with us. He even became a front page star on the Albany Advertiser when he was lost at Middleton Beach. It was a human interest story about a farm dog being lost on the beach.

We found him weeks later in Mt Barker. I went with a friend who had a driver's licence and picked him up. We think Benny jumped onto the back of a ute down on the beach and went for a long ride. When I knocked on the door of the house and it opened, Benny heard my voice and ran down the passage. Such a happy ending.

Benny died age 17 and is buried on the driveway of the Lime Lake farm. Mum and Dad would argue for years after his death about whose arms were holding him when he took his last breath.

A couple of years passed after that Christmas and my aunty and uncle were transferred to Cunderdin. Once again, we did the long trip on a very hot day. Mum made Dad stop outside of the town and wash our faces with a wet flannel using water from a puddle on the side of the road. Then from a bag, like a magician, she produced our 'Show Day' dresses along with shoes and socks (little girls always had new dresses and special shoes for the October Katanning Show) and we stripped off and were dressed hurriedly in case someone came along the road.

Being the big sister Mum wanted to impress her younger sibling, who had two sons, with how beautiful her daughters were. There was always a sense of rivalry and jealousy between the two of them, which considering what they had been through as children should have been replaced with a strong bond of friendship and support.

This Christmas I received a tea set, which lasted the day when a cup was broken somehow as John, Allan, Pam and I played 'afternoon tea' out on the enclosed verandah.

The first Christmas at Cartmeticup saw Pam and I (age nine) being woken in what seemed the middle of the night with lots of laughter coming from the back yard. We snuck out to see what was going on and Mum, Dad and Nanna were trying to put up an Indian Tent, which was going to be a surprise for us in the morning.

Dad was inside the tent, Mum was telling him what to do and Nanna was trying to help and stay out of the arguing at the same time. She had drunk a few sherries, as had Dad drunk a beer or two and Mum probably had a shandy.

When Mum saw us girls hiding on the verandah she threw a teary tantrum about how the surprise was spoiled and we both got told off and put back to bed. It didn't matter that we had seen the tent, it was still a surprise when we got up in the morning. We crept out to look at the tree in the lounge room, to see a big standing blackboard which I knew would have been for me.

Dad always went out with an axe to drive somewhere to get the tree. He would usually spot one in the months before. The day my brother was born, Dad was walking through the kitchen dragging a tree when the phone rang from the hospital to tell him that he had a son. Nanna answered saying, "Cartmeticup 6". She listened for a moment and then threw her arms around him saying, "Ooh Ken I am so happy you have a son". I was watching and I thought what is so special about a son?

Christmas lunch was very different back in the 50s. It was kept simple by budget restraints and for practical reasons. At our house the midday meal was served around the kitchen table. So as not to have the wood fired Metters stove going flat out on a hot day and heating up the room, we had cold meat and salad and enjoyed a trifle with custard and jelly, and of course the Christmas pudding with sixpences hidden in it. The salads were old favourites, a watermelon cut up with onion and sprinkled with mint, sliced tomato and onion in vinegar, and don't forget the beetroot in jelly. Then kept until the last minute, out from the kero fridge to the table came a plate of the still popular devilled eggs.

No wine or beer was served, but there was a fruit punch made of ginger ale, cold black tea and pineapple juice in a big bowl that the kids could dip from all afternoon.

We made the decorations around the walls from crepe paper and there were always crackers on the table to pull with a little object and a napkin inside. One year I remember making little paper baskets filled with homemade coconut ice and pieces of toffee for each place setting.

In our house there was a wonderful Christmas tradition and our mum wholeheartedly threw herself into the magic of the occasion. In the middle of the night, when she was sure that we were asleep, she would sneak into our bedrooms and leave at the bottom of our bed a pillowslip filled with something special and interesting little things like puzzles and a book of crosswords that would entertain us for hours on Christmas Day.

And for some reason strangely a tiny set of tin scales.

This routine didn't stop when we grew out of our childhood. I remember being twenty-one and my pillowslip was filled with balloons to give it some bulk and at the bottom was a package of face makeup and some new bathers.

Merry Christmas to all and stay safe.

The biggest annual road trip for the Wagin District Cricket Club presented itself on Saturday when they travelled to Boddington. As all elite athletes do, the majority prepared themselves both mentally and physically by attending the Wagin Trots Christmas Meet the evening before. An evening of indulgences and camaraderie saw the team up for the challenge that lay ahead.

Two exciting inclusions for the Wagin team were Jack Holt and Gert Swanepoel. Holt's return to the town on school holidays is always celebrated by his family and local sporting clubs. The power full forward is also a very, very handy cricketer. Swanepoel joins the illustrious Wagin District Cricket Club from the Kukerin-Dumbleyung club with thanks extended to A and T Scanlon for their recruitment of the pace bowler to town.

It is hoped that Captain Dwight Kellow picked winners at the trots with greater success than he does at the toss at cricket. Every game this season he has lost the toss. However, Boddington's Captain in a Pat Cummins type move opted to field first, sending the Wagin team into bat.

Jamo Davidson and Jack Holt opened the batting displaying good talk between the wickets. On an oval that presented as a perfect place for a picnic with its lush green grass, it also meant that the run on it was as slow as a sloth wearing gumboots. There was many a well struck ball that stopped dead in its tracks meaning fours were almost an impossibility to achieve.


